The first of a series of meetings to discover what North Shore taxpayers want their schools to do and what kind of graduates they wish to have produced, will be held on Wednesday evening of next week at the First Congregational church, 1417 Hinman avenue, Evanston.

The meeting will take the form of a panel discussion in which the following will participate: Thornton W. Merriam, director of religious activities at Northwestern university; Dean Frederick C. Grant of the Seabury-Western theological seminary; Rabbi Charles E. Shulman of the North Shore Congregation Israel, Glencoe; Prof. James Alton James, dean emeritus of the graduate school of Northwestern; the Rev. Lester Mondale, of the Evanston Unitarian church; Charles Thomas of the Evanston Quaker meeting, and the Rev. Charles Heimsath of the First Baptist church, Evanston.

The meeting is being held under the auspices of the North Shore Teachers' union, a branch of the American Federation of Teachers.

**Travel Expo Will Be Held at Stevens Hotel Next Month**

The third annual International Travel exposition, sponsored by The Chicago Daily News, will be presented in the grand ballroom and exhibition hall of the Stevens hotel, Chicago, April 28, 29, 30, and May 1.

Word has been received that the San Francisco Golden Gate exposition, opening in 1939, will exhibit. More than 120 railroads, steamship, air and bus lines, state associations and government bureaus already have indicated that they will participate. To accommodate all, it has been necessary to lease the largest convention hall in Chicago—that of the Stevens hotel.

There will be continuous entertainment from 11 a. m. to 10 p. m. each day of the exposition. An exposition theater is being constructed in the exhibition hall, where travel lectures, sound motion pictures, musical selections, folk dancing and fashion shows will be staged. Admission both to the exhibition hall and the exposition theater will be free. Children, however, must be accompanied by adults.

An Exposition Number of The Chicago Daily News will be published Saturday, April 23, carrying complete programs and exhibit booth locations. Sixty thousand reprints will serve as directories for those attending the exposition and will be distributed to all those entering the exhibition hall during the four days and evenings of the affair.
