

SHATTUCK BOYS PERFORM DRILLS

Alumni, Guests Are Entertained on Tuesday at Community House in Winnetka

Alumni of the Shattuck school, Faribault, Minn., pioneer military and college preparatory school of the Middle West, and their guests met at the community house in Winnetka, Tuesday evening, at a dinner which was followed by a program of drills and motion pictures.

High point of the evening was the drill, given in the gymnasium of the community house, by the crack drill team of 16 boys. The organization, which has been in existence for more than 50 years, is conducted by the students themselves without faculty assistance.

The boys wore black blouses and white trousers in a uniform designed after that used at the United States Naval academy in the 1880's and carry Springfield rifles of the model of 1876.

The 16 youths, three of whom acted as alternates and sentries and one as a captain, executed their complicated maneuvers and rifle exercises virtually without commands.
