"I.E.S." Lamp Need Not Be a Puzzler

According to Mr. H. C. Reynolds, district superintendent of the Public Service company, one of the most frequent questions asked of Miss Bjorklund and Miss Scholl, home lighting advisors, who are now calling on Wilmette and Kenilworth house-wives, is, "what is an I. E. S. lamp." It is a lamp which carries the approval of the Illuminating Engineering society.

A certain professor of electrical engineering one day visited his niece, a freshman at a leading university. The atrocious lighting by which the girls in her dormitory were obliged to study shocked him, and upon further investigation he discovered that equally poor lighting was handicapping students throughout the country. This condition was not only injuring young eyes, but, as scientific research has proven, was endangering students' health and general welfare.

The professor, a member of the Illuminating Engineering society, a nonprofit service organization occupying somewhat the same position in the electrical world that the American Medical association occupies in medical circles, became interested in developing lighting equipment which would give both a good quality and a good quantity of light. The net result was a set of specifications and fiftyfour rigid requirements which a lamp, manufactured by any concern, must meet before it can bear an I. E. S. certification tag.
