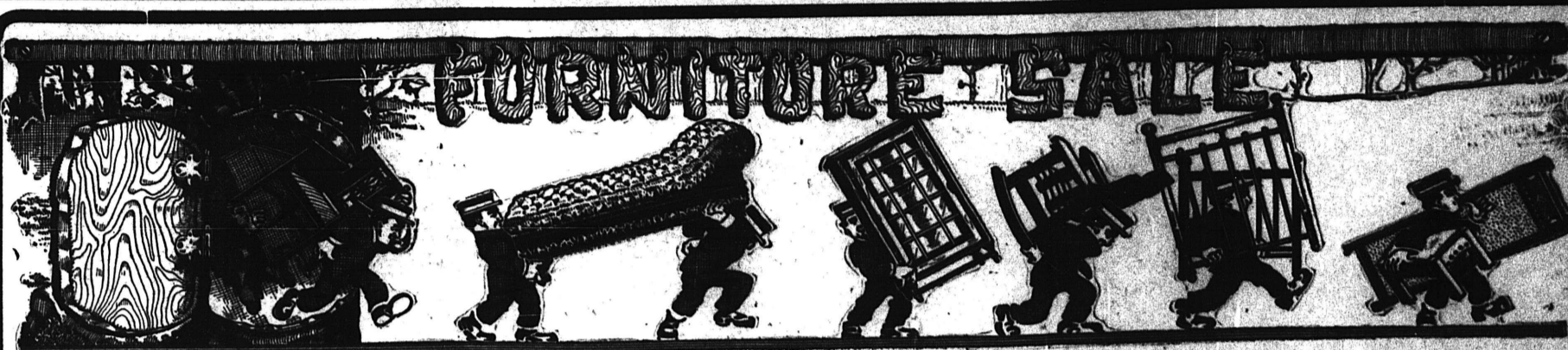
### ARRESTED AS SPEEDERS.

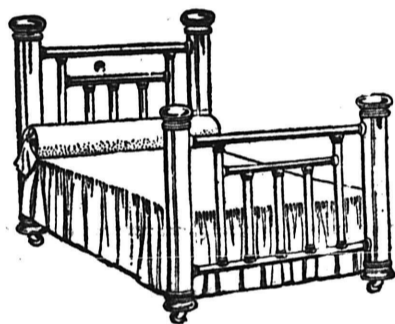
### COLORED MAN FINED.

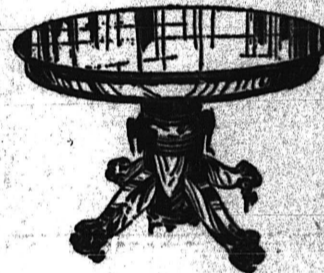

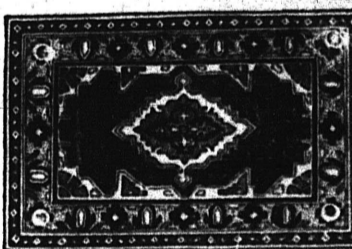

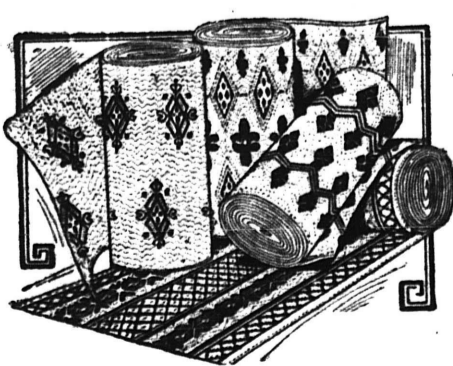
