Fund to Help Starving Students of Europe

To help the undernourished and starving students of Austria, Russia, Germany and certain of the Balkan countries, students of Northwestern university conducted a novel free-will offering on the Evanston campus this week. Large and small Christmas candles were utilized as favors; each candle was red in color, and each tied with a purple ribbon. Donors to the Student Friendship Fund received a small candle. Large red candles, similarly decorated, were given to each fraternity, sorority and similar student organization contributing \$30 or more. Such organizations will place the large candles in their windows the week before Christmas, and on Monday night, December 17, Northwestern University Glee clubs, men and women, will tour the campus and wherever a large red candle is exhibited, the singers will enter the house and entertain the members for twenty minutes.

Harding H. Hawes, of Atlanta, Ill., a junior in the school of commerce at Northwestern, is chairman of the Student Friendship fund this year at Northwestern and has planned this week's campus campaign. Last Friday morning Conrad Heffman, executive secretary of the World's Christian Student Federation, who has directed the relief work among refugee students, told of the immediate need for clothing and provisions affecting thousands of zealous students of the old world and made a strong appeal for quick aid.

"I think that Northwestern students don't need to be driven to give to such a cause," commented Mr. Hawes.



"Therefore, we don't plan a drive on our campus. We simply are expecting our men and women students to do their duty, as they always do, when a call for help is made."

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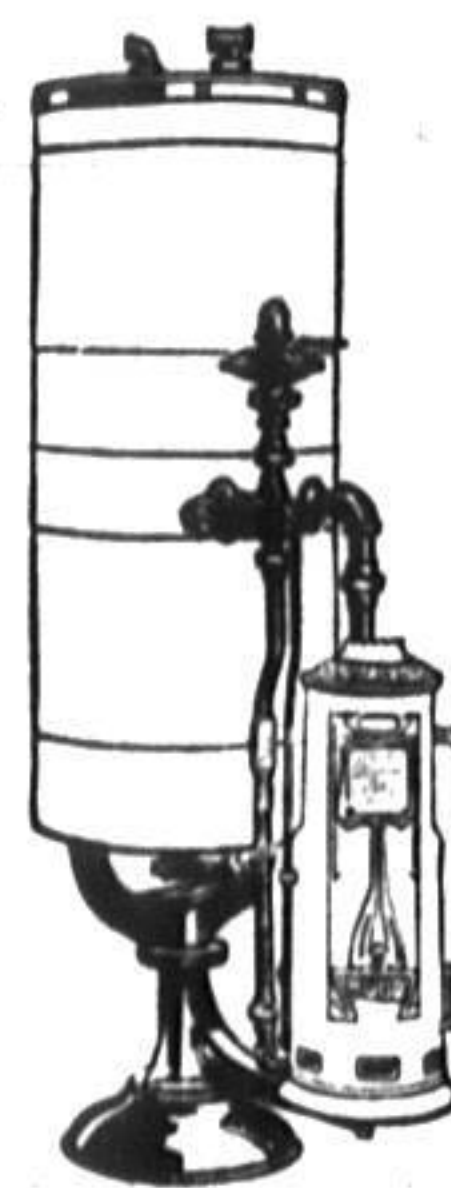
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
