Signal Seen From Air Reveals Lake Tragedy

TRAVERSE CITY, Mich., March 25.—(AP)—The body of Don Campeau, 25-year-old Charlevoix fisherman drowned last week off Manitou Island after an explosion of his fishing boat, was brought to Traverse City Tuesday by a Coast Guard plane.
