Although the lead changed hands often during the early and intermediate portions of the game, the outcome was never really in doubt. Coach Dutcher was aware of this fact as he substituted early and freely. Frontline reserves, Goupil, Moore, and Skiba were all used in the first half to keep the attack fresh. The early loss of Kroll proved inconsequental. The obviously superior Jacks were even able to employ the timeworn art of verbal haging with telling

None of this is to say that the Jack's victory was insignificant. On the contrary, a relatively easy win with only a few men producing near capacity (an unheard of combination of events last year)) speaks well for the ability of this ball club.

Guard Hubert has finally matured into a standout 'college performer. He scored with every conceivable shot, he assisted teammates brilliantly on occasion (particularly on the infrequent fast breaks), and his work on defense as above reproach, save for two or three inexcuable lapses. Hubert's back court mate, Tom Miller's lack of game experience showed occasionally, as did Forward Jere Chaffin's, but both are fine athletes and band workers who will gain confidence with each game.

Freshman Dave Goupil and Ray Moore, the top reserves, were understandably jittery. Both are good shooters who are in need of league experience and all-round game improvement. Both will help the team immensely

It is impossible to tell about the big men. Dave Kroll, who everyone knows is a fine rebounder - shooter, had one of those nights that leave ball players (and Coaches) sleepless and mumbling. A couple of close questionable calls eliminated Kroll via the foul route early in the second half.

Garry Gunderson, acclaimed by some as the league's best big man, was seldom fed and had to score on offensive rebounds, tipins, and foul shots.

Of this performance it is impossible to sum up the Jacks. The things they do best (run and rebound) they did seldom against Northwestern, yet they won easily. This team will undoubtedly get tougher as the season wears on and should win some ball games.
