

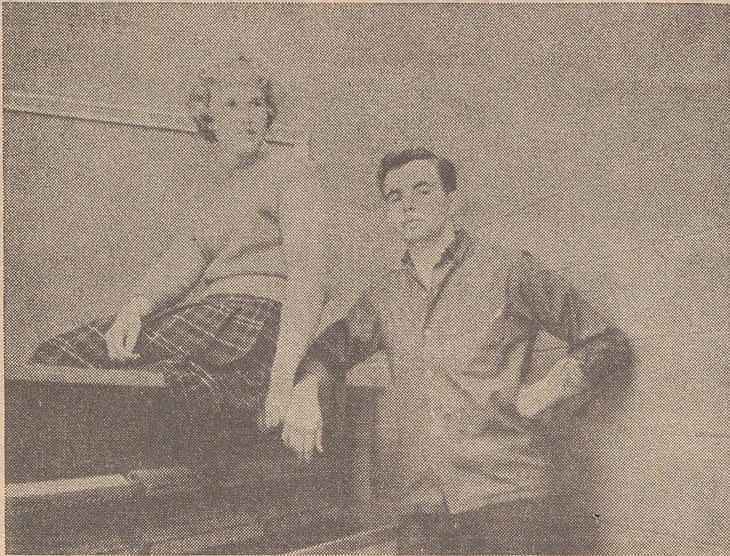
# Outstanding Actor, Actress Named Students Voice Opinions On Kentucky Journey

The A. C. C. student body is evenly split in their reaction to the baseball team's Kentucky trip sanctioned by the Board of Education and slated for April.

In a survey taken this week students were asked "Do you think that using money from the student activity fund to finance the Kentucky Spring tour of our baseball team is justifiable?"

A large segment of the student body was polled and when the results were tabulated 46% were in favor of the trip, 42% were against it, and 12% didn't have an opinion on the subject.

The trip's supporters contend that the student activity fund is for student activities and that the trip definitely falls under this classification. Although a few maintained the trip to be of educational value none seemed to linger on this point.

Opponents were more stringent in their criticisms of the Southern tour. One student remarked "There should be competition in Michigan without having to go to Kentucky."

A conservation student opposed the trip and demanded to know "Why the baseball team has their fare paid to Kentucky and at the same time, conservation students are required to pay a \$6.00 fee to finance a field trip which may never get beyond the planning stage."

## Ferry Service to Mackinac Island Expanded

"Tourists and vacationers will find it easier than ever to get to Mackinac Island this year." So says Tom Jewell, general manager of the ferry line composed of the Mackinac Island Ferry Co., and the Straits Transit, Inc. "Expansion of the line and additions to the fleet coupled with an improved schedule will bring about faster, more courteous and more efficient service to the Island," said Jewell.

Mr. Jewell, whose company presents the first major competition the Arnold Transit Company has faced in years, stated that the main improvement this year will be the resumption of the St. Ignace to Mackinac Island run. The company which began operations four years ago, at first carried people to the renowned summer vacation spot from both Mackinaw City and St.

Ignace but last summer due to increased traffic in Mackinaw City the entire fleet was shifted to that town and the St. Ignace run abandoned. This summer because of additions to the fleet the company will again be able to provide service to the Island from both sides of the Straits of Mackinac.

"We talked to many people in the St. Ignace area before making the move," says Jewell, "and they felt our reopening in the town would be beneficial to the area not only by providing more summer jobs for college students, but also by breaking the virtual monopoly held last year by the Arnold Line, improving the efficiency and courtesy of the over all service. And, of course, simply increasing the number of boats tightens schedules and reduces waiting time."

Mr. Jewell stated that two boats will definitely run out of St. Ignace. There will be a Mackinac Island Ferry Co. departure every forty-five minutes. Headed by the two-hundred foot long, one thousand passenger "Straits of Mackinac" five boats will operate out of Mackinaw City making possible a departure every half hour.

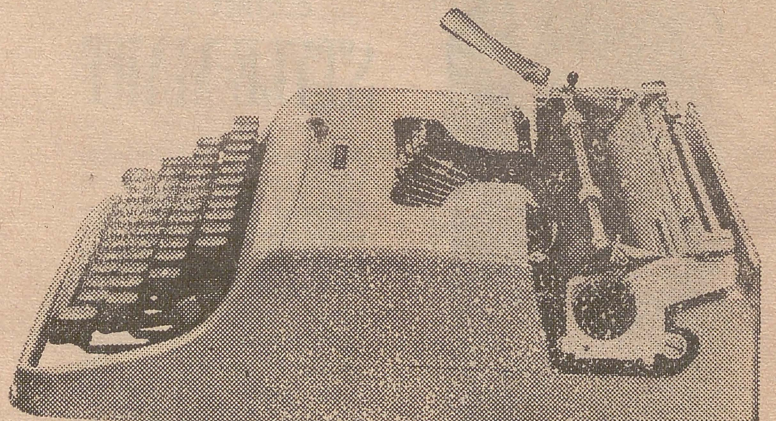
