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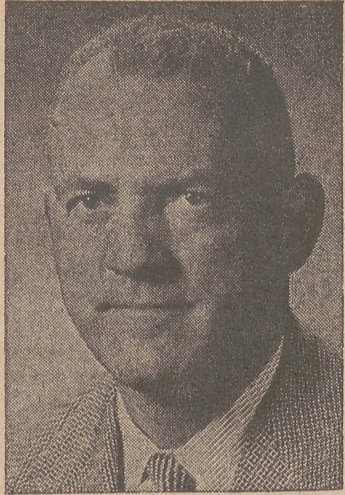

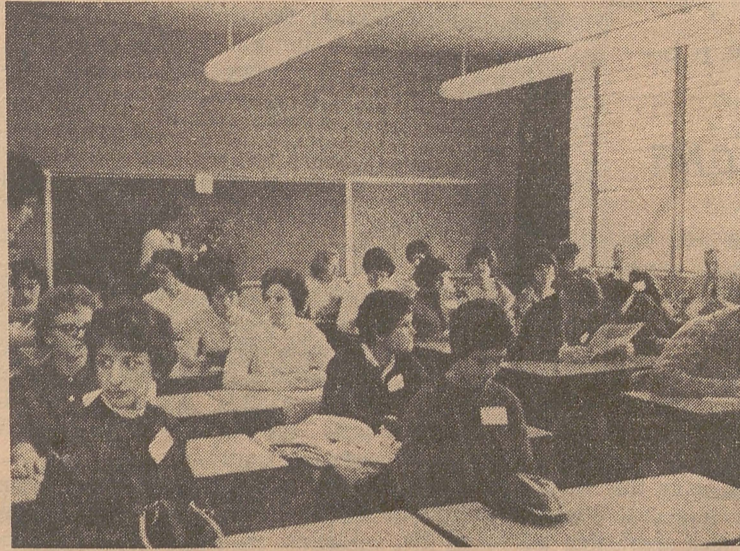
In recent weeks, the **TIMBER-CRUISER** staff has been interviewing local industry executives on topics concerning the relationship between local industry and the college.

Mr. Robert Ryan Resigns To Instruct at St. Cloud

Mr. Robert D. Ryan has resigned his position as acting Director of Student Services, coordinator, and instructor of engineering drawing to accept a position in the drafting department at St. Cloud State College in St. Cloud, Minnesota.

He has served at ACC for the past three years. He received his B.A. degree at Wayne State College in Wayne, Nebraska, and his M.A. at Colorado State College, where he has done additional graduate work.

After graduation, Mr. Ryan did some chemical work for a plastics corporation. He then worked for a construction company as a surveyor and a heavy equipment operator. He has also worked as a crew chief, a draftsman, and a consultant for several civil engineering companies. Before coming to Alpena Community College Mr. Ryan instructed at the University of Minnesota at Minneapolis.

He will return to Colorado State

at Greeley, Colorado, at the beginning of this summer to work on his doctorate before assuming his post at St. Cloud next fall.

Peace Corps Tests Set for Saturday

Peace Corps exams will be given Saturday, April 21, in the old post office building, at 9:00 a.m. Tests are open to all high school graduates 18 years of age. No appointment is required.

Students accepted for Peace Corps service will be eligible for two-year positions in Africa and Asia. Members' expenses are paid in training and while on duty.

An average crowd attended.

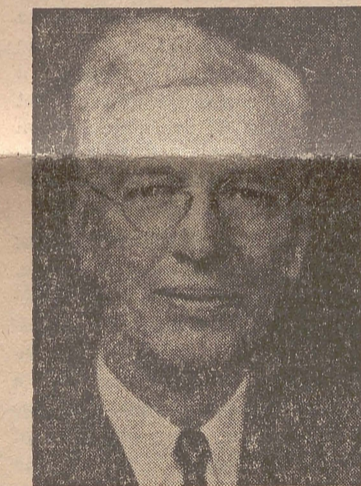
The social committee is busily planning and preparing for the annual spring semi-formal dance to be held at the Masonic Temple on May 5.
