New Student Affairs Director

Mr. Thomas F. Ritter, instructor in accounting and economics, has been appointed to the office of Director of Student Affairs.

Upon being asked about his new duties, Mr. Ritter stated that they consisted principally of work in four major areas: counseling and guidance, student housing, job placement, and student extra curricular activities.

Counseling and guidance consists mainly of conducting orientation and testing sessions, readmission, and many other facets of an advisor advisee program.

A student housing list is compiled after inspection of the housing facilities and is offered to students so they can make their own selection: the student makes his own choice - rooms or apartments are not assigned. The office does not tell the student where to live, but it does provide a list of approved student housing - rooms and apartments.

As far as job placement is concerned, not much has yet been done. His intentions are that in the next year or so, the college will set up a job placment bureau to assist graduates and undergraduates in getting part time and full time jobs during both the school year and the summer.

Student extra curricular activities: he wishes to build and streamline the system of extra curricular activities at the college. He believes that students should work with and through the Student Council to enrich the student activity program.

Mr. Ritter received his B. A. degree in Business Administration from Ferris Institute and his M. A. from Michigan State University. He has been at A. C. C. for one year.

College Offers Insurance Program

This year the Insurance Company of North America is offering to the students of Alpena Community College an accident and sickness insurance plan. The cost is \$19.15, which is very cheap for an offer of this type.

It is important that the student knows that the policy is offered on a waiver basis, which means that if the student does not reject the plan before a certain date (which is very soon) it is assumed that he chooses to purchase this insurance.

The plan pays up to 100% of surgical expenses up to three hundred dollars, depending on the nature of the surgery. Hospital room and board are also paid under certain conditions.

ENROLLMENT
