be as great as was the case last year. A detailed analysis of enrollment will be provided the student body in subsequent issues of the TEMBER-CRUISER.

At this time, I would like to urge both freshmen and sophomores to set high academic standards. It is becoming increasingly evident that only students who prove that they are scholars will be given an opportunity to proceed to a bachelor's degree. It is perhaps unfortunate, but nevertheless, true, that higher educational opportunities in the next few years will be limited to those who clearly demonstrate that they are capable students.

I would like to also advise students to make careful plans regarding all activities and have all details of any enterprise carefully planned and all details arranged well in advance of any deadlines. For example, within the last half hour, I talked to a father of one of our graduates about a financial problem that was greater than would normally be the case, because the graduate delayed until midsummer to apply for an NDEA Loan; and, consequently received only onehalf the amount that would have been available had the graduate applied last spring.

The coming year, at the moment, looks like a good one for the College. It may well be the most significant since the College opened. More on this later. It is the eleventh year of the College, the beginning of the second decade, and it promises to continue the substantial growth, both in quality and quantity that the College has always enjoyed. There is reason to believe that there will be great student interest in the College and loyalty to it as the College that represents their first experience with higher education. In subsequent columns, I will indicate some ways in which this interest and loyalty can be demonstrated and implemented.


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
