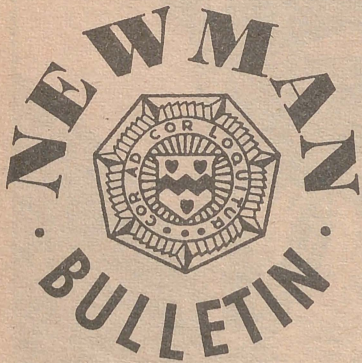

Students Attend Human Relations Workshop

On the weekend of October 25, 26 and 27, five students and a faculty member from A. C. C., Bruce Cash, Delores Godfrey, Bev Meden, John Konwinski, Bill Josephson, and Mr. Oosting, went to the 12th annual Michigan College Workshop on Human Relations. The conference was held at St. Mary's Lake in Battle Creek.

The conference was sponsored by the National Council of Christians and Jews, Inc., but there were members of other religious organizations present also.

Registration was at 4:00 p.m. on Friday the 25th and from that time on the students' time wasn't wasted. There were general sessions, informal "let's talk" groups, and small work groups. At 10:00 p.m. there were social hours each night, but the students had to rise at 7:00 a.m., so everyone was anxious to get to bed.

The main topics of discussion were religious and social issues. Some of the informal "let's talk" group discussions were Concerns and Contributions of Foreign Students, Interreligious and Interracial Dating, and The Role of the College Press.

In the small group discussions members of schools similar in size met and discussed problems pertaining to their schools.

This is one type of problem that the Social Calendar Committee will be asked to solve, along with the actual posting of these activities in some central location.

The Student Council will be strictly enforcing the rule which states that an organization must have any club - sponsored activity approved by the Council at least ten days prior to the activity. The reason behind this strict enforcement is not to discourage clubs from sponsoring activities, but it is an attempt to make it easier to secure chaperones, make money from the Student Activity Fund available, if needed, and to assure sufficient time for advertising the event.

After a club sponsored activity has been approved by the Student Council, it must be registered with the Social Calendar Committee so that they can place it on their calendar.

The Student Council and the Social Calendar Committee will appreciate the cooperation of the various clubs at A.C.C. in trying to make all social activities more successful.
