ADDITIONAL NOTES OF INTEREST:

The college listed the "no shows" for the first semester, 1963-1964. There were 47. Although information is not available on many of them, the information provided suffices to make it clear that there is no geographic concentration of "no shows." There are 8 of the 47 who plan to attend next semester that we know about, and possibly others have only deferred their educational program at Alpena Community College. There were also 4 students from India who we believe had difficulty with exchange problems due to policies of the Indian government. Fifteen are women. As nearly as can be determined except for the facts mentioned, the reasons for students who were admitted not enrolling are as varied as the number of individuals.

It can be pointed out that had somewhat better than half of the "no shows" registered enrollment would be at the projected enrollment of 450 equated full-time students. When "no shows" were checked early in September, there were only 22.

It should be pointed out that the enrollment increase over 1962 is 7.46 per cent on the basis of head count and 3.83 per cent on the basis of equated full-time membership.
