On October 19th and 20th the Sophomore class of Alpena Community College held their annual election of officers. The officers elected are as follows: President—Terry Schmolztz; Vice-president Carl Ackerman; Secretary—Dianne Mousseau; and Treasurer—Marty Hughes. The

curriculum of each is as follows: Terry Schmolztz— Business Administration; Carl Ackerman— Physical Education; Dianne Mousseau—Elementary Intern Program; and Marty Hughes— Physical Education. Ninety three of the total class of two hundred one Sophomores voted in the election.

ACC Fraternity Being Organized

For the first time in the history of Alpena Community College a local fraternity will be organized. Action has been taken to institute a legal constitution and sponsors have been chosen. The fraternity, Sigma Phi Zeta (EIZ) will have it's headquarters at 370 Oliver street. Here the officers will reside. The remaining members will live at their respective homes.

Initiative taken so far, by active members, has been two open smokers. The first smoker was used to gain insight on interest and feasibility. The second smoker gave birth to the following matters; choice of frat pins, crest design, the assignment of pledge books and agreements on organization procedures. The days November 16 through November 22 were designated as pledging week. During this week the pledge has to obtain the signatures of the fraternities three founders and two advisors. The three student organizers are; Lee Szczesniak, Dave Oliver and Dick Silver. The advisors include M.D. Orr and John Neumann.

Szczesniak, one of the most active organizers stated his main reason for supporting the fraternity, "The main purpose of Sigma Phi Zeta is to promote a more intense social life at A.C.C."

John Teglovic, a freshman pledge from Willard, Ohio, stated that he, "joined for excitement and a chance to get to know people better."

Initiation festivities are not scheduled yet but when Teglovic was asked what would take place he replied, "I'm afraid to think!"

The fraternity will be composed of 10 to 15 actives. The fraternity's constitution was written by Szczesniak and submitted to the Student Government for ratification at the Governments November 15th meeting. Gary Davis, Student Government President, asked the fraternity to rewrite the constitution and make alterations according to the Governments qualifications. Szczesniak is in the process of completing it to meet the Student Governments specifications.

When the constitution is ratified, the members initiated and the officers elected Sigma Phi Zeta will become the first sanctioned fraternity ever organized at A.C.C.

Student Overload

The students are on the verge of rebellion at Alpena Community College. The complaint is the overabundance of outside readings, plus the mounting cost of these books. The teachers are using the text books at a minimum. For example, the political science text book has not been used as of October 12, and that book cost over nine dollars.

Some of the courses with these outside readings are anthropology, U.S. history, and history of western civilization. In each of these classes there are twelve to fifteen hundred pages of outside readings required. It is apparent that the student expects some outside assignments, but if he is taking two or more of these classes this excessive work, plus his text book assignments could total more than SIX THOUSAND pages of reading.

A minority of the students are capable of doing the work well and completely. But in what condition does that leave the majority?

The concensus of the student body is for a cut in these readings so they may devote equal time to each subject and finish their assignments completely.
