37,000. Despite this great increase in enroll-ment, the quality of education has not gone down but has become better because of his early administration policy which called for better quality in education along with the enrollment increase.

President Hatcher is a past president of the Association of American Universities and in 1965 he headed the American delegation attending the Tokyo conference of International Association of Universities. He has also headed a Ford Foundationsponsored study mission to the Soviet Union and South America.

Although his position is very demanding, President Hatcher has found time to study one of his favorite subjects - the history of the Great Lakes and before he assumed this position he had written three books about them. In 1963, in association with Erich A. Walter, recently retired secretary of the U-M, he published "A Pictorial History of the Great Lakes.

Dr. Hatcher received three degrees from Ohio State University: Bachelor of Arts in 1922, Master of Arts in 1923 and the Doctor of Philosophy in 1927. He also did post-doctoral work at the University of Chicago.

President Hatcher has received many honorary degrees and is currently active in many educational organizations.





Collegiate Singers is a college credit course worth one credit per semester. At the present time, the choral group is enjoying its highest peak of membership, with fifty-five people enrolled.


First '67 Student Forums Initiated

Central Association. "This
is the highest possible accreditation afforded to a
college and is recognized
anywhere in the United
States."

When asked his opinion towards the break-away of the College from the Alpena Board of Education he replied, "I'm in favor of studying it." In his annual report of 1965 he indicated that he felt it was important that the College be separated from the Alpena Public School System, and at the present time such a separation is under consideration.

In the future Dean Van Lare feels that it is very important that the Educational Student Center or Student Union be built. "This will serve as a melting pot—a place to bring all kinds of students together." With the help of HEF (Higher Educational Facilities Act) this will soon be possible.

Stanley Van Lare will be leaving the college in June 1968, yet he will remain in employment as consultant for the purpose of helping with the millage campaign until December 31, 1968 at which time he will fully retire.

Dr. Elbridge L. Dunckel, professor of physical and biological science and anatomy at Alpena Community College, has been selected as president-elect of the Michigan Association of Higher Education.

The announcement was made Thursday by Dr. Milton Brown, director of the association which is made up of professors and instructors in the universities, four-year colleges and junior colleges of Michigan.

The appointment of Dr. Dunckel marks the first time a junior or community college teacher has been elected to the office of president-elect which automatically makes him next year's president.
