#### Stork Arrives At ACC Hatchery

Since November 10, when 93,184 Chinook salmon eggs arrived at Alpena Community College, approximately all eggs have hatched. About two weeks after hatching, the salmon fry will losetheir egg sacks and will have to be fed. The feed which comes in two sizes, starter, and number one, has been shipped from the Glencoe Mills in Minnesota. The water supply to the incubators is now being heated to a temperature of between 50 degrees F., and 54 degrees F. The total egg loss at the present time is approximately 1,000 eggs.

Dr. Dunckel stated that the students' participation in the watch program at the hatchery has helped a great deal in the problem of keeping a constant check on the water temperature. The students check and record the temperature of the water each half hour and also do other chores at the hatchery.

The Student Center should be used as much as possible. Also, all eating facilities should be under one roof. By moving the Snack Bar to the Student Center, both of these aims are met.

One of the main reasons for moving the "Bar" was so a more collegiate atmosphere can be obtained. The feeling is that there are two seperate student bodies in ACC; the students from Alpena and those from out of town.

By putting the "Bar" in the Student Center, it will cause more mingling between these two bodies. Naturally, many students (and instructors) will grumble about having to walk "way down there" for lunch. However, the Student Center is only about 450 yards from Central Hall. That's not very far compared with most colleges. Anyway, I don't think the walk will hurt anyone.

Another reason for the move is that by using our Student Center as much as possible, the proposed new Student Union will be easier to justify. Or, as Mr. Ritter said, "Why build a

1-1/2 million dollar building if we don't use the one we have?"

The vending machines in the Smoker will be less convenient than the present situation. But the Administration is looking to the future, not just the present. That is, of course, the way it should be. Naturally, since this move has not yet been officially announced, it is still open to suggestions. If enough people want a different plan, it can be arranged. If no one has any better ideas, the Snack Bar won't be with us in Central Hall much longer.
