ACC is planning to extend its educational wings by holding classes in Tawas and Rogers City and changing the curriculum at Wurtsmith Air Force Base (WAFB).

If all goes as scheduled, classes that may be offered at Tawas High School are as follows: Speech 121, Abnormal Psychology, English 112, Child Development, Introduction to Business, Introduction to Education.

Plans in Rogers City are similar. They may have the following classes ready by second semester: accounting, business law, psychology, political science, English, computers and principals of management. These classes were chosen by residents via surveys done through The Chamber of Commerce and Rogers City High School. Only 10 students are needed

to form a class.
