"Our Concrete Tech proposal was the only one outside of California to win an award this year," said Robert Eller, Concrete Techonolgy instructor.

The focus of the competition was to propose new technologies which could eliminate the growing number of waste tires by creating novel rubber products. (2) "The institution has effectively organized the human, financial, and physical resources necessary to accomplish its purposes."

In other words, Davis said, the institution should have adequate learning resources to support its academic programs. It also looks at the qualifications of the faculty and staff.

(3) "The institution is accomplishing its educational and other purposes.'

Davis explained that the institution is required to have educational programs that are appropriate for its level of education. There should be student services that support the purposes of the institution. The staff and faculty should contribute to the effectiveness of the institution.

(4) "The institution can continue to accomplish its purposes and strengthen its educational effectiveness.

The institution should have a resource base (financial, physical, and human) to prepare for the future. It should also have adequate resources to support its plans for strengthening both the institution itself as well as its programs.

(5) "The institution demonstrates integrity in its practices and relationships."

The institution is to have publications that describe its operations and programs. The institution is to have ethical and responsible relationships with other institutions.

Once these standards are met, then every so often the institution is reaccredited. This is the case here at ACC
