Scarlet falls short

The first feature-length motion picture of Nathaniel Hawthorne's classic, The Scarlet Letter, since the 1926 silent version recently opened nation-wide. It claims to portray Hawthorne's work, but this modern production is loosely based on the original.

It stars Demi Moore in a well-cast part as the defiant seamstress Hester Prynne, who is publicly outcast for giving birth to a child out of wedlock.

Gary Oldman plays the strong-willed Reverend Dimsdale, who suffers through deep-rooted guilt and self-punishment. He is the unknown father of Hester cret to themselves. 


