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1990 GRADUATE LORI LISKE AND INSTRUCTOR HERB GAMAGE review the student program progress report (PPR), a computer-generated document which has improved the academic advising process at Alpena Community College. Based on their area of interest, students are assigned to an academic advisor upon admission to ACC. Together they plan a course of study that will enable the student to achieve whatever educational goal has been set -- career training, skills updating, transfer to a senior institution or personal enrichment. The PPR keeps track of courses needed and completed, quickly providing a written statement of this important planning information at any time. This is particularly convenient for part-time students who may take only one or two classes at a time and complete their programs of study over more than the traditional one or two-year period. Faculty advisors will be available to meet with Alpena campus students Aug. 21-23 and also by appointment (356-9021). Students who'll attend the Huron Shores Campus can contact director Tim Sleevi, 739-1445.

Offer 1-semester corrections officer program at Huron Shores this fall

Corrections officers are in demand and residents of the Alcona and Iosco counties have close access this fall to training that will get them priority placement on Michigan Department of Corrections employment lists.

The Huron Shores Campus at Wurtsmith AFB is offering ACC's one-semester

corrections officer training program, which is certified by the Michigan Correctional Officers' Training Council.

It includes these five corrections courses: LAW 231, 235, 236, 237 and 238.

They're conveniently scheduled Monday through Thursday from 5 to 8:30 p.m. and Saturday from 9 to noon

New ACC program will meet demand for utility employees

If you like to work outdoors and enjoy hearty physical activity as part of your daily routine, there's a job waiting for you -- as soon as you complete the new Utility Technician Program at Alpena Community College!

While students enroll for the first semester of training, industry observers are counting the positions which will open up over the next three years and looking to ACC for trained entry level employees to fill them.

The pay is good. Starting wages currently are \$12 to \$13 an hour, increasing to \$16 or more an hour after three to four years.

ACC's two-semester program was developed under a \$15,000 grant from the Michigan Electric Cooperative Association. A study conducted by ACC found there was no educational program in the state to provide field training and practical theory in the various phases of power line installation and maintenance.

The need for such a program has been illustrated by the statewide support which has come as industry representatives reached into their pocketbooks to provide start-up funds.

Contributions include \$15,000 each from Alpena Power Co. and Edison Sault Electric, along with \$6,000 from Cloverland Electric. Scholarship assistance has been donated by various electric cooperatives and among those donating equipment are Alpena Power and Presque Isle Electric.

"Your staff needs to be commended," Bill Gregory of

Edison Sault Electric told the ACC Board of Trustees. "You have the environment, you have the people and you'll get the job done."

Gregory came before the board in May to support initiation of the 34 credit hour program. He pointed out that ACC's program over the next several years will provide companies like his the ability to identify replacements for some 200 highly-trained, highly-skilled workers and to fill an estimated 50 new positions.

Until now, Gregory said, Michigan utilities have had to provide on the job training for high school graduates they wished to employ, seek out military veterans with appropriate background or "steal" good linemen from other companies.

Men and women who graduate from ACC's program will be qualified to work with electrical, telephone and telegraph transmission systems.

They'll be headed up in the world as they routinely climb 40-foot power poles to install cross arms, conductors, transformers and switches. They'll know how to operate digger and derrick trucks and how to accomplish underground as well as overhead distribution, construction and maintenance.

Are you up to the challenge? Openings remain in this fall's initial class of 30 students. For more information, call ACC's Admissions Office, 356-9021 Ext. 200.

Tuition

Tuition at Alpena Community College is based upon residence and is computed on contact hours (actual time spent in lecture, laboratory or recitation instruction).

Students who are residents of the Alpena Community College District (which has the same geographic boundaries as the Alpena Public Schools District) pay the in-district rate.

Cash, checks, VISA, Master Card, or money orders payable to ACC are accepted at Alpena.

At Huron Shores, no cash is accepted.

In-District \$33 Per Contact Hour
 In-State \$49 Per Contact Hour
 Out-of-State \$75 Per Contact Hour
 (no student is charged for more than 21 contact hr/sem)

In addition, students enrolled on campus are assessed a Student Services Fee of \$2 per contact hour and a Facilities Maintenance Fee of \$3 per contact hour.

Most student services now available at Van Lare Hall

Renovations under way this summer will allow Alpena Community College to consolidate its students services activities in Van Lare Hall.

The major area of change is in Rooms 100 and 101, formerly the offices of the dean of instruction and assistant dean of student

services. That area will now also include:

- an open student reception area;
- the offices of admissions counselors Bonnie Urlaub, Rick Counsellor and Frank McCourt;
- career planning and placement office; and

- the Women's Resource Center.

Also now located in VLH is The Learning Center, formerly across Johnson Street on the second floor of the Donnelly Natural Resources Center. TLC has a new home in Room 127, which locates its admissions placement testing function close to other admissions activities.

ACC's placement testing and admission policies aim to assure quality and opportunity

In order to assure quality in programs and at the same time provide the opportunity of an "open door" to all who wish to further their education, Alpena Community College has policies regarding admission and placement testing.

ADMISSION

Admission to the college is granted to persons 18 years of age or older who:

- have a high school diploma or GED or
- have a satisfactory reading level as measured by ACC placement tests or
- enroll in specialized training programs not leading to a degree or certificate.

These guidelines apply to admission to the college only; admission to a specific curriculum or course is based on student interest, achievement and test scores necessary for entrance into the particular program or course.

High school seniors who have the recommendation of their counselor or principal may be admitted for two courses, or up to a maximum of eight credit hours per semester.

PLACEMENT TESTING

The ASSET skills assessment measures the level of a student's writing, reading and numerical skills and is used to make recommendations concerning course placement. Results may indicate the need for instruction through The Learning Center to increase the student's basic skills and success in college level course work.

The ASSET placement test is required for:

- all new students who do not have a high school diploma or GED and
- all new students who register for nine semester credits or more and
- all students who for the first time are registering for an English or math course.

The test requires two to three hours, depending on one's math background. Contact the Admissions Office (356-9021 Ext. 200 or 229) for more information.

Pursuing educational goals is challenging at any age, and since Alpena Community College is here to help students succeed, we provide a number of services to address some specific needs.

Women's Resource Center, located in Van Lare Hall, is adjacent to the female counselor's office. It provides a place for small group meetings, includes a phone for personal phone calls and features informational literature, video and audio tapes.

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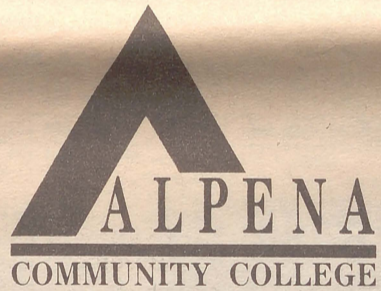
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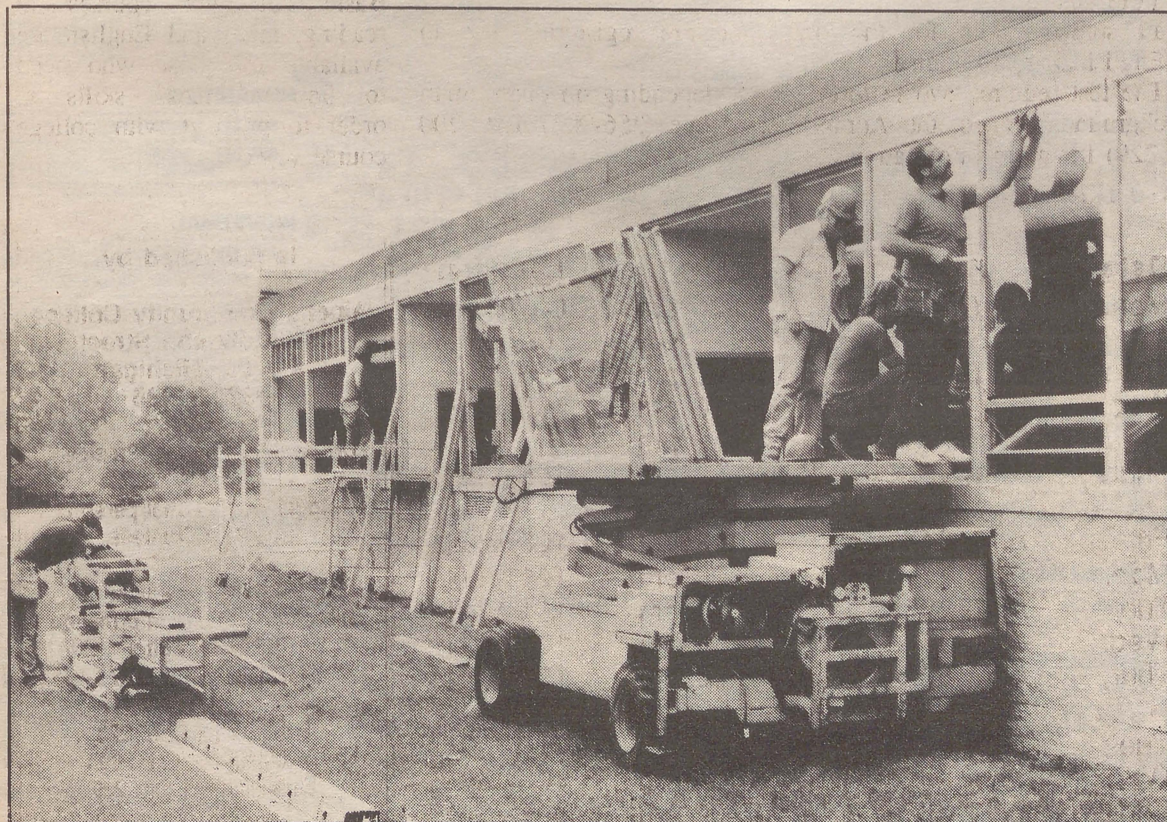
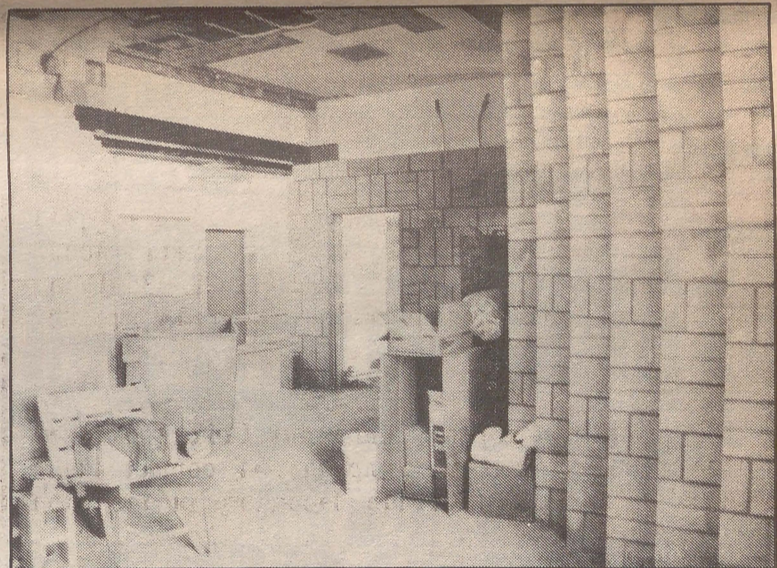
Renovations at ACC to improve student services and reduce energy use, costs



THE SIGN OF things to come (above) appeared in the Van Lare Hall circle drive in late May, accompanied by a parade of contractors' vehicles. Equipment unloading construction materials June 6 framed "Van Lare Hall," creating a momentary image of sculptural art (right). Returning students will find a "new" Van Lare Hall as more than \$152,000 in exterior and interior renovations are targeted for completion this month. Included is installation of double doors to provide barrier-free access to the building which houses most ACC student services.



THE FORMER LOBBY at Van Lare Hall is being transformed into a new student reception area (right). Other work includes installation of a \$97,000 boiler to replace the original boiler which has operated since VLH opened in 1958.

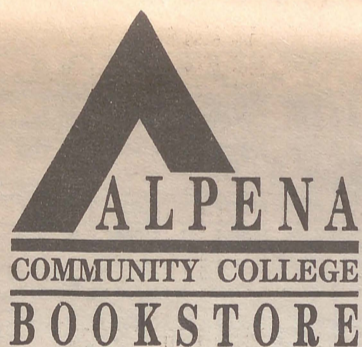

Jorgenson, an Alpena native, said he pursued an education at ACC after being laid off from his job

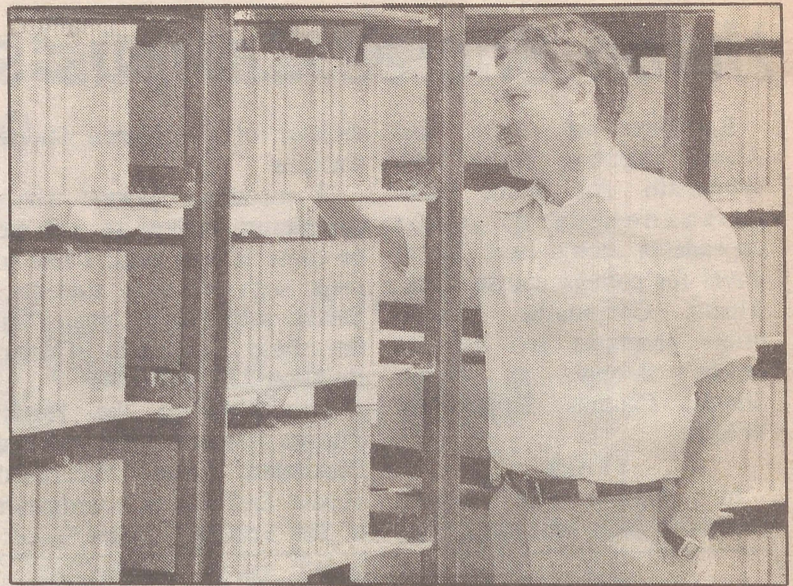
at a local manufacturing plant.

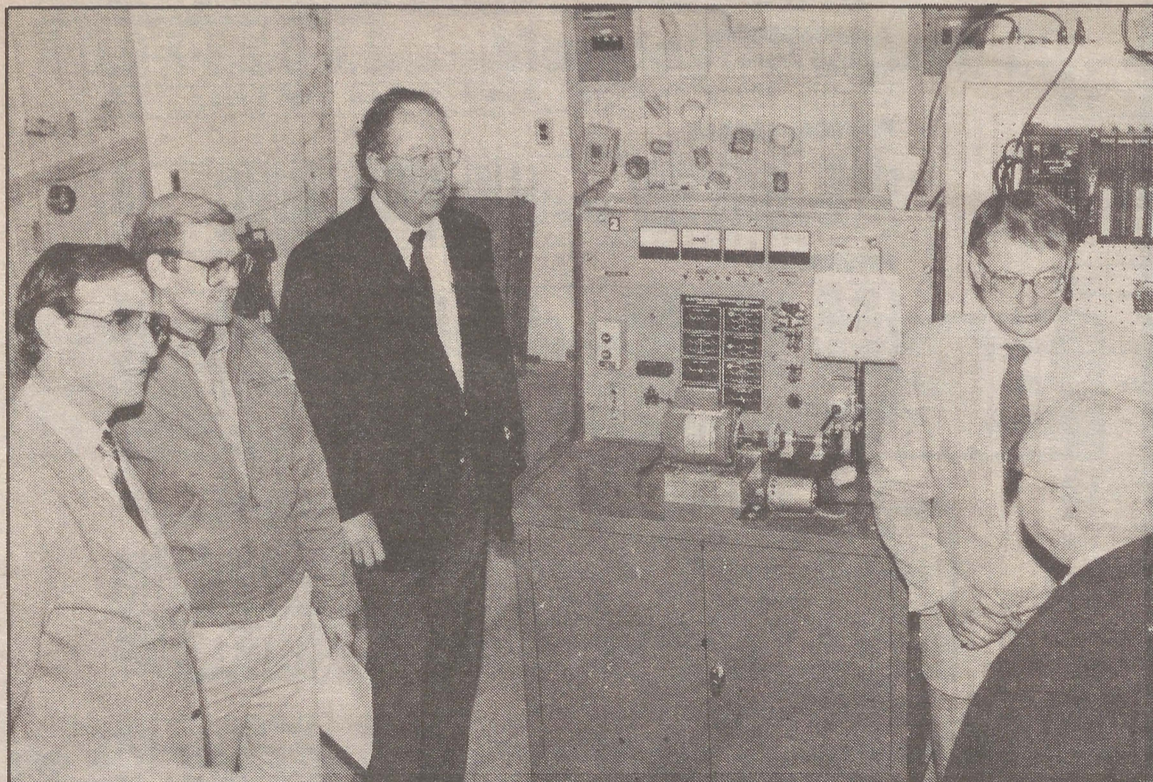
They're an attractive young couple with daughters ages 3 and 5, and Carol and Brian Kienzle (right) have a lot more than that going for them because of ACC.

Financial aid can help you pay for college costs
