



STUDENT SENATE ELECTIONS COMPLETED

Yes, it did take an awfully long time, but the 1980-81 Student Senate of A.C.C. is finally completed.

Student Senate elections were first held on Friday, September 12 on the ACC campus, and the new electees -- along with the sole holdover from last year -- were formally recognized and proclaimed as members of the 1980-81 Student Senate of ACC on Wednesday September 17.

When returning chairperson Todd Bordewyk, who was elected to his position by last year's Student Senate, called the September meeting to order, the following people were formally received as members of the 1980-81 Student Senate.

Elected to the position of vice-chairperson was Sarah Dowling, who received a total of 61 votes from ACC students. Challenger Beth Anderson made it a close race for Sarah, though, as she received a total of 44 votes in her quest for that position.

In the race for the three remaining representative positions available for sophomore candidates, Diana Flakes came out in first place, getting the nod from 56 voters. Sal Frontiero came in sec-

ond, capturing a rather respectable total of 39 votes. Vice-chairperson candidate Anderson was offered the third sophomore rep. position on the basis of her 44 votes for vice-chairperson, but she declined for personal reasons.

When Anderson declined, Dowling moved that Diane Dargis be appointed to fill the remaining sophomore representative spot, and Bordewyk, Flakes, and Frontiero concurred. So Dargis was formally appointed, and there was a total

of five members on the 1980-81 Student Senate -- just five out of the eight required under the current rules which govern the Student Senate at ACC. The other three spots are reserved for freshmen representatives, but none of those who desired to become freshmen reps. had turned in their petitions on time, and were therefore technically ineligible to be elected.

This presented a problem for the five sophomores, and so they had to determine how to get three

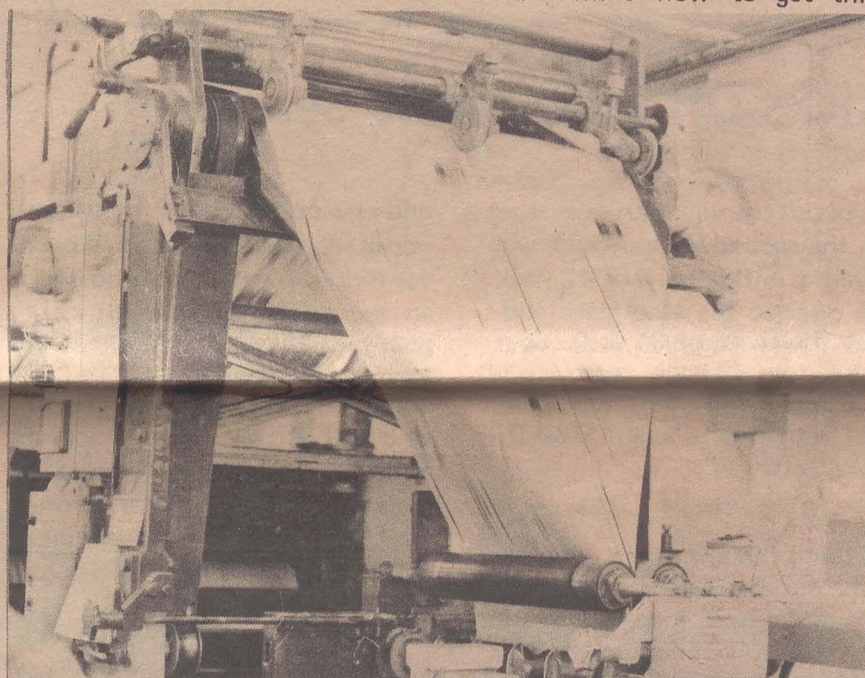
freshmen reps on the Senate as soon as possible. Dowling noted that since two freshmen among those turning in their petitions late -- Stuart Grenkowitz and Tom Skiba -- did have a total of 30 signatures each on their petitions, they must have some support among freshmen students. She moved that these two be appointed as freshmen representatives, and the other Senate members agreed.

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Missing Your I.D. Card?

Do you happen to be wondering about what has happened to your student identification card for the fall semester of 1980? Well wonder no more, for **Campus Update** has been told that each and every ACC student should be able to receive their I.D. cards within the next couple of weeks.

That statement was made by Mike Hood of the ACC records office, who also said that the reason we do not already have them is because the college ran into a few snags while making the transition to the new computerized system of registering, which was used for the first time this year. Therefore, plans were made to print and distribute all I.D. cards at a later date. (Hood did mention, however, that anyone who needs an I.D. card may receive a temporary one simply by request from the records office.)

Of course you would, and that is one of the reasons why the Alpena County United Way organization is asking for your help in order to meet the goals of the 1980-81 United Way campaign.

You see, when you donate money to the United Way, there is a very good chance that you actually are helping someone whom you know very well -- perhaps someone very close to where you live. The United Way helps to support 12 local agencies in their efforts to serve Alpena and the surrounding communities, along

with 24 state-wide charities that they support by giving money to the United Way of Michigan.

Locally the United Way supports groups like the Alpena County Chapter of the American Red Cross, the Big Brothers/Big Sisters of Alpena, and the Senior Citizens Council of Alpena. Many

of these agencies simply could not provide the services that they do if it were not for the funding which the United Way provides, which in the long run must come from people like you.

The people behind the 1980-81 campaign started on September 23, and will work up until October 21, at which time the campaign will end. They are seeking to raise a rather large amount of

money -- 244,976 -- which represents a 15½% increase over the entire amount of money raised during last year's campaign.

Of course, it is not a requirement that you know someone in need in order to make a donation to the United Way. In fact, I believe that most of the people who do contribute to groups like United Way do so not because they know someone personally who may be helped by it, but simply because they know that someone out there is in need -- and they are in a position to help.

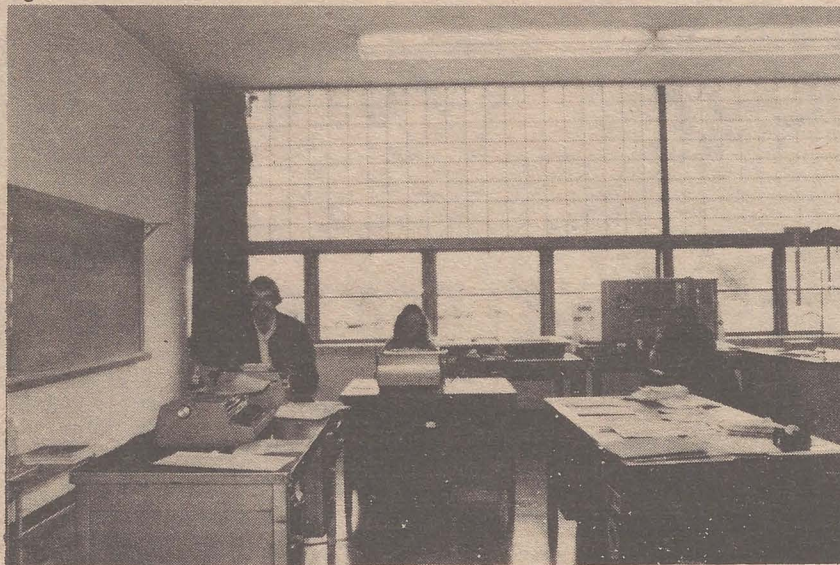

Flag Football Kicks-Off I.M. Sports Season

An ACC flag football game between 12-Pack and Spu-Kcufs kicked off the 1980-81 Intramural sports program at the East Campus field at 4:00 p.m. on Tuesday, September 16. With a total of seven teams competing in this year's flag football program, it looks like another active year for the IM sports program at ACC.

In the 4:00 p.m. game, 12-Pack bested Spu-Kcufs by a score of 24 to 18.

In the second game, which was played at 5:00 p.m., the Mad Merr-Odders beat Flying High by a score of 26 to 0.

Results of some of the other games are:

Sept. 17--

Thirteen demolished the Animals by a score of 26 to 0.

Sept. 23 --

Flying High squeaked by the Animals by a score of 14 to 13. Tim Roeske ran two 25-yard touchdown plays for Flying High, who also succeeded with a two point extra-point conversion.

For the Animals, Scott Green ran two 30-yard td's, but the extra point was good on only one attempt, making the score 14 to 13. With time running out, Flying High held the Animals on the one foot line and goal to go, and

pulled out the victory.

In the second game, which was played at 5:00 p.m., the 12-Pack team crushed the Mad Merr-Odders by the score of 36 to 0. Scoring for the 12-Pack team were Jim Straley with two td's, Gary Dodd with two td's, and Paul Gilmet with two td's.

Sept. 24 --

In the 4:00 p.m. game, the Spu-Kcufs outlasted the Lions by a score of 18 to 6. Scoring for the Spu-Kcufs was done by Jolly and Bissonette. Hinde intercepted a pass and ran for 45 yards before he laterally handed off to Jolly, who went in for the TD. Then in the second half, Jolly ran a 50 yard punt return for another TD. The other TD came on a pass from Janson to Bissonette. All three attempts at extra points failed.

The lone score for the Lions came in the final minutes of play as Brown hit Denomme with an end-zone pass. The extra point try failed.

Sept. 30 --

The Lions man-handled Flying High in the first game by a score of 50 to 13.

Scoring for the Lions were: Brown with a pass to Szymanski for 6 points--extra point was good; Brown ran for 30 yards

and 6 points--extra point no good; Brown passed to Woron for 6 points--extra point no good. In the second quarter, Brown again passed to Szymanski for 60 yards and 6 points, and the extra point was good. In the second half, Brown ran the kick-off back for 6 points, but the extra point was missed. Later, Brown ran for two more td's and also passed to Szymanski for 6 more points.

Scoring for Flying High was done by Leask, who ran 35 yards for a td and threw to Fox for the extra point. Leask ran again in the second half for 6 more, but the extra point failed.

In the second game, the Spu-Kcufs clobbered the Thirteen by the score of 40 to 14.

DRUG USAGE DOWN

(NO-CR)

More conservative attitudes toward drug use were found in a U. of Michigan survey of 17,000 high school seniors. More than 3/4 of the young people said they disapproved of experimenting with any drug other than marijuana. Nearly 70% disapproved of regular marijuana use and 34% said they were against trying pot once or twice. The survey findings continue a trend first noticed in 1977, say researchers.

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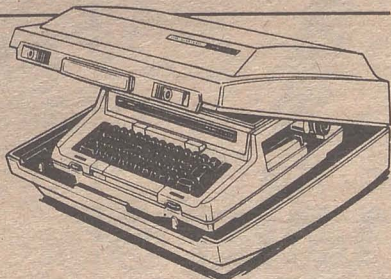
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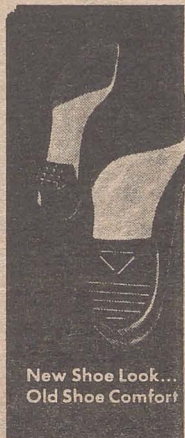


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V.A. News

Thousands of veterans will not get their education aid checks on time...unless Congress acts swiftly on a \$40 million supplemental appropriations bill. This money is earmarked for the 128,000 veterans who registered for benefits under the G.I. Bill after August 28, 1980.

Veterans who have been regularly receiving their payments under the G.I. Bill will not experience delays in their payments, said Dorothy Starbuck, director of benefits for the Veteran's Administration. Only those who registered after August 28, and who expect to receive an additional month's payment in advance; payment for classes already taken, or payment for work study programs would be affected.
