

Frank Pickard reelected President Student Senate Meets




At the recent Board of Trustees meeting Dick Miles, Physical Education teacher at Alpena Community College, was granted a sabbatical leave unanimously by the board.

A sabbatical leave is an academic leave which an instructor can qualify for after teaching for seven years. Miles was granted the leave and will receive half of his normal salary plus fringe benefits.

Mr Miles will be focusing his leave on a new cardio-respiratory
