



Arts Council Presents Film

The ACC Arts Council Student-Faculty Film Guild has recently presented Phantom of the Opera and Animal Farm, a double feature in a series of films for this year. Phantom of the Opera featured Lon Chaney as the hideously disfigured Phantom living in the caverns beneath the Paris Opera House in the 1880's. The second feature was Animal Farm, a feature-length animated cartoon based on George Orwell's sinister allegory of political and social life. Both were excellent films.

The Arts Council will be presenting it's next film on April 11, Red Desert. The following synopsis is taken from the Arts Council bulletin. "It is not surprising that the inspiration of this film is a locale rather than a plot of character. Giuliana (Monica Vitti), like Vittoria in ECLIPSE, seems to have been stripped of purpose and emotions by a stark, dehumanized environment. She is unable to cope with the barreness of this world, and has attempted suicide in the past. Antonioni contrasts the pale, muted colors of the landscapes with Giuliana's brightly colored hair and clothing, to suggest the conflict between the woman and her surroundings. In an early scene, Giuliana, in a bright green dress, moves sluggishly through a dark lot, filled with heaps of black sledge.

The incidents of the film further stress Giuliana's difficult pursuit of a meaningful life. When she visits her husband, an electronics engineer at an industrial plant, she is unable to communicate with him; their voices are drowned out by the din of the plant. She wants to open a store, but is held back because she cannot decide on a color scheme for the store and what goods she should sell. After a disappointing affair with a mining engineer (Richard Harris), she becomes temporarily paralyzed (a psychosomatic ailment), she tells him a story of a girl on a remote island, who one day hears a beautiful, distant singing. The girl tries to discover where the voices are coming from, and eventually realizes that they are 'everywhere.' Antonioni depicts the tale in bright, lish colors which contrast sharply with the subdued color tones in the rest of the film. Shortly after Giuliana tells the story, the child is able to walk again, and his mother seems to be discovering new values in her environment."

Red Desert will be shown at 8:00 p.m. at Thunder Bay Jr. High "Little Theater". Tickets will be on sale at the door and in the Van Lare student lounge prior to the showing. Bring a friend.
