# COUNTERACT ON ICE PROBLEM

"I think we are doing a super job of keeping the campus ice-free," said Mr. Witt of Buildings and Grounds. Compared with other areas of Alpena, he feels the ACC campus offers some of the best ice-free parking and walk ways in town.

"The most difficult area to keep ice from building up is on the center sidewalk on VLH side next to Johnson Street. We plow and brush access areas every morning from six to seven o'clock," commented Mr. Witt.

In the past, the school has been sued only once due to problems caused by ice, but that case was lost by the plaintiff because the court decided Buildings and Grounds were doing the best job possible under the circumstances.

Mr. Witt stated that "if anyone has any suggestions, just identify the problem and come up with a solution, and if our budget permits, we will do the best we can."

"My main concern is safety," he said. There is a problem in the parking lot with Mother Nature. With Mother Nature, she seems to get her kicks from sending Alpena a warming trend and then sub-zero arctic winds. This causes build-up before we can deal with the last meltdown / freeze up. "Under unusual weather conditions, we are doing a pretty good job of keeping the campus bare."

Well, some answers have been revealed to help ease the minds of concerned students. According to ACC counselor, Richard Counsellor, the college catalog must be viewed as a breif summary, which highlights the main objective of each course.

The course descriptions are accurate but sometimes they might not appear so due to the different teaching methods of instructors. The brief summary is also used as a guideline by four year colleges to determine transferrability.

According to Mr. Counsellor a number of courses listed in the catalog have been placed on an inactive list. Meaning that the inactive courses still exist, but will only be offered if students generate demand for the course.

The removal of all nonexisting courses will take place when all other corrections and modifications of the college catalog are complete.
