


I look around and see young energetic people who are acting like their grandparent, they're just ignoring everything that's important. We are a generation who thinks nothing of the ones to follow us.


Do you want your children to breathe fresh air, to be able to go camping in a forest, and to not have to worry that their life is going to end in a blinding flash of light.
