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Liquor Warnings

An issue presented in Congress regularly during the past 20 years won a victory on November 18, when President Reagan quietly signed the bill into law. The new federal law requires alcoholic beverages to carry warning labels.

All liquor, beer and wine must carry the message: "Warning: According to the Surgeon General, women should not drink alcoholic beverages during pregnancy because of the risk of birth defects. Consumption of alcoholic beverages impairs the ability to drive a car or operate machinery and may cause health problems."

The law takes effect November 18, 1989. The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco & Firearms has 90 days to issue requirements on where the warning will appear on the package, as well as details such as its typeface and size.
