FINANCIAL AID ACC can be even more affordable

One of the best selling points at Alpena Community College is that it costs less than going away to school.

Tuition rates are lower, and you save room and board costs by living at home. You don't sacrifice quality, either. Even if vour ultimate goal is a fouryear degree, it makes sense to save by completing the first two years at ACC and then transferring for the final two vears.

More than half our students are in transfer programs, and follow up studies show that ACC transfer students overall have higher grade point averages as juniors and seniors than the university "natives."

We believe that's because of the smaller freshman and sophomore class size at ACC and the efforts of instructors and staff to help students be successful.

But even though it's less costly at ACC, your education requires a financial investment. That's where financial comes in.

Over half our students are awarded some kind of financial aid, which will total more than \$1 million by the end of the academic year.

Obviously, we go the extra mile to find financial assistance for those who qualify. Financial aid may still be available for 1991-92 year, but you have to get the paper work done soon.

It can take as long as six weeks for the service which determines your eligibility for federal and state programs to return the necessary information.

You can pick up a Financial Aid Form (FAF) in Van Lare Hall 107 at the main campus or from the ACC Huron Shores Campus office at Wurtsmith AFB.

Among the financial pro-grams available are Federal Pell Grants and Stafford Loans.

Some students qualify to earn money for their educational expenses through College Work Study, and Supplemental Education Opportunity Grants may be another source of aid.

Four State of Michigan programs, including Michigan **Competitive Scholarships** provide financial assistance to eligible students.

Even part-time students. Michigan Adult Part-Time Grants totaling more than \$20,000 were awarded last year.

In addition to need-based programs, many organizations have scholarships based on academic achievement. The Alpena Community College Foundation is an example of one such source. Although most such awards are made for the fall semester (see listing on page 9), occasionally some funds are available.

Tuition

Tuition at Alpena Community College is based upon residence and is computed on contact hours (actual time spent in lecture, laboratory or recitation instruction).

Students who are residents of the Alpena Community College District (which has the same geographic boundaries as the Alpena Public Schools District) pay the in-district rate.

Cash, checks, VISA, Master Card, or money orders payable to ACC are accepted at Alpena. At Huron Shores, no cash is accepted.

In-District	\$35 Per Contact Hour
In-State	\$52 Per Contact Hour
Out-of-State	\$79 Per Contact Hour
(no student is charged for	more than 21 contact hr/sem)
There is a \$10, non-re	fundable registration fee

In addition, students enrolled on campus are assessed a Student Services Fee of \$2 per contact hour and a Facilities Maintenance Fee of \$3 per contact hour.
