





History



SINE hundred years is a long time in the life of a congregation in a country of such comparatively modern civilization as Canada. When a little band of adherents in 1830-as demonstrated by marriage certificates and other documents-established the parish of Grace Church, William IV. had just succeeded to the throne of England, the battle of Waterloo was still fresh in the minds of men. and the Confederation of the Dominion Provinces was not to take place for thirty-seven years. At that period Brantford, so named in 1826, was simply a little village on Indian land with a population of some 300 souls. Under such circumstances the decision to build a church demonstrated a good deal of courage and faith, more especially as money a century ago was very scarce and financial obligations were not lightly undertaken, or, if undertaken, not easily discharged.

For two years the members held services in the homes of each other, and Rev. Robert Lugger, who had been appointed by the New England Company in 1827 to minister to the Six Nations Indians, officiated at weddings and funerals, and sometimes preached.

In 1831 Joseph Brant, always a strong adherent of the Church of England, set apart a block of three acres as a site or endowment. This land, as indicated on an old map, included the property on which the Free Library stands. Lot sales, no doubt, helped in the financing, and later the land for the church site was donated by A. K. Smith and his sister, Mrs. Margaret Kerby. The first edifice was erected in 1832 and it was of frame. painted white. At the front there was a steeple and two balls of wood, connected by a vertical iron bar, and midway between these two balls there was the sheet-iron

figure of an angel holding a trumpet. In addition to the auditorium there were galleries. In the course of years it was decided to have a new structure, and the wooden building was moved to the rear of the property, facing Pearl Street, and services were continued in it while the new brick structure was in course of erection. On October 14, 1856, the corner stone of the present house of worship was laid with impressive Masonic honors, Rev. Benjamin Cronyn. D.D., of London, preaching an eloquent sermon from the text: "'Not by might, not by power, but by My Spirit,' saith the Lord of Hosts." The inscription on the stone was as follows:—

"IN THE NAME OF THE FATHER, AND OF THE SON, AND OF THE HOLY GHOST. AMEN.

This Corner Stone of Town and Grace Church, In this Parish of Brantford, and County of Brant, and Province of Canada,

Was laid with ample Masonic honors by

WILLIAM MERCER WILSON, Esq., Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Canada, in the presence of the

REVEREND BENJAMIN CRONYN, Rector of London, D.D., and Rural Dean, C.W. and many Priests assisting.

THE HONOURABLE AND RIGHT REVEREND JOHN STRACHAN D.D., LL.D., being Bishop of the Diocese of Toronto:

James Campbell Usher, Clerk, Incumbent of Brantford, and

Thomas Botham and Henry Racey, Church Wardens, John Turner, Architect of the Church,

ON TUESDAY, THE 14TH DAY OF OCTOBER, A.D., 1856,

And in the twentieth year of Her Majesty Victoria of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith." There was a disquieting incident at the dedication when the crowded galleries of the old church gave way, but fortunately only sank a few inches and no one was hurt. Proceedings were then continued in the open air.

The Grand Master, with a silver trowel, spread the cement, the stone was lowered and an address was delivered by the Grand Master after a Psalm had been sung. Then followed the benediction and the large concourse dispersed.

The building committee consisted of Matthew William Pruyn, George Samuel Wilkes, Alexander Bunnell, Alexander Green, Thomas Botham and Henry Racey.

The original trustees were Rev. R. Lugger, William Richardson, Lewis Burwell, W. F. Wallace and Reuben Leonard.

It was not until 1835 that a permanent rector was appointed, the Rev. J. C. Usher entering upon his duties at that time and continuing until 1872, when he resigned after a pastorate of thirty-five years. In 1872, Rev. Arthur Sweatman, afterwards the Archbishop of Toronto and Metropolitan and Primate of all Canada, was appointed, and in 1874 he sent a letter of resignation in order to accept the position of principal of Hellmuth College, London, and to be secretary to the Bishop of the diocese and examining chaplain. In the same year he was succeeded by Rev. R. H. Starr, M.A. He remained until 1879 and then became interested in the work of the church in the United States, passing away in New York in 1926. To his memory a handsome pulpit was erected in 1927 as a memorial tribute from Mrs. Starr. In 1879, Rev. G. C. Mackenzie, later Archdeacon, was chosen to succeed Mr. Starr, and then commenced a long and successful pastorate of thirty-eight years duration, the reverend gentleman resigning in 1917. It was during his incumbency that the work of establishing suburban churches was intensified. In 1917 Rev. J. B. Fothering-

ham, now Archdeacon, was appointed. and is still rector.

Thus, for the period of a century, only five rectors have ministered to the congregation—a record which is unique in the church annals of Ontario.

During the passing years there have been additions to the church and many internal improvements, and a large new Parish Hall has been erected. The memorial tower, the gift of Col. Reuben Leonard, a Brantford boy, now of St. Catharines, was commenced in 1916 in memory of the long association of the Leonard family with the church. The tower was completed in 1918, the year in which the Armistice was signed after the Great War. The wording of the inscription is as follows: "This tower and peal of bells are the gift of Reuben M. Leonard, an offering of praise and thanksgiving to God for victory in this year of Grace." The inscription is a chronogram, by which the date is given though hidden.

One hundred years of sanctified effort and ministration. Who shall estimate the value of this service to the community or compute the far-reaching influences that have radiated from the mother church of Brantford?




O Almighty God, who hast built Thy Church upon the foundation of the Apostles and Prophets. Jesus Christ himself being the head corner-stone.
