#### From the Editor:

This is a story about community spirit, and how it helped the City of Brantford awaken to its multicultural roots. As a salute to the 1974 centennial of Alexander Graham Bell's telephone invention in Brantford, a handful of ethnic groups staged open houses thoughout the city. The International Villages Festival has since grown from this modest effort to a fullscale showcase.

When you think about it, the tale of the International Villages Festival is a truly remarkable story of how a community staged an enormous event over and over again by dint of volunteer commitment and conviction. And it was done well indeed. In fact, Brantford numbers among an elite few municipalities who can boast of long-standing events of this magnitude which run for a duration of 8 days.

This is also a story of the vast potential a city has for realizing a tourist influx by promoting its most valuable resource: its citizenry. The naysayers may scoff until retail receipts are tallied, but those who know the true essence of the Villages and its ramifications attest to the enormous positive effect on the local economy. Regardless of dollar and cents, Brantford is richer for the Festival's infectious fun and goodwill and the atmosphere it creates for visitor and resident alike.

This is not a comprehensive guided tour of 'the Villages'. Instead, it is a taste of the flavour of a festival that is unique by the very nature of its continual metamorphosis: as the number and extraction of participant Villages fluctuate, we witness a realistic reflection of the community as it is enriched by the settling and organization of ethnocultural elements in our immediate society. Experience the Villages to the fullest and catch the spirit which has made this southwestern Ontario's premier multicultural festival!







What kind of mascot could ever represent an entire world of diverse cultures? A big cuddly bear who boasts a large wardrobe of course! Meet Ethno, our larger-than-life ambassador who is ready for a polka or a plain bear-hug if that's your fancy.

Ethno sprang to life from an artist's rendering in 1984 and took shape through the craftsmanship of the same people who created Toronto Blue Jay's B.J. Birdie and other big event favourites. A clever teaser campaign introduced audiences to the newest member of our promotional team. This was coupled with a contest eliciting public suggestions for an appropriate name for such a festive character. Ethno was christened, this name having proven to be the popular choice among many hundreds of suggestions.

The golden honey-bear with his twinkling eyes and roly-poly belly dons the instrument or costume

of a different Village each year. In his inaugural year, Ethno strummed a bandura and donned a fez to feature the Ukrainian culture. His metamorphosis on paper next year into a proper British bear was most amazing as he sported a snappy Union Jack and beat a military drum. The red, white and green of Hungary's costume vividly clothed Ethno in 1986 complete with intricate frog details on his vest and deep pleated white sleeves. The 1987 edition of Ethno features our Canadian Pioneer roots in the western garb. Souvenir hats and buttons, (as well as the passport cover) illustrate Ethno in his full regalia, clearly 'must-haves' in our series of collector's novelty items.

Sounds a bit much for a massive bear to be fussing with costumes, does't it? Our live-size buddy stays his same cuddly self from year to year, a reconizable symbol of friendliness at the Festi-

val. You may see him in an out-door banner as an international V.I.P., 'bearing' (an irresistable pun) a dapper top hat and impressive sash of world-wide flags. This is our sign to the visitor that all are welcome within for the hospitality that Ethno embodies.

# A DASH OF MEXICAN FLAVOUR

Join in the fun as the Ballet GRAN FOLKLORICO DE MEXICO comes to Brantford. Paralleling the ideas of the International Villages Festival, the Company creates for Mexico and the world an opportunity for better understanding as it presents a vivid view of authentic folklore through the beauty of songs, music and dances of the Mexican people.

As family entertainment, the Ballet GRAN FOLKLORICO DE MEXICO presents a rhythmic, rapid-paced panorama depicting Mexico of the past & present. Swirling dancers, exuberant singers and talented musicians explode with energy and rhythm to the amusement of young and old.

The upbeat mood of the evening is an unlikely environment for a history lesson, but the performances weave the ancient cultures of 1500 BC into the context of current folk arts as influenced by the Mexican Indian, Spanish and Negro elements.

Only one command performance will be staged at 8:00 p.m. on October 27. (Tickets are available for \$15.00) at all Villages during the Festival, at the Ethnoculturefest office or at the Capitol Theatre Box Office. But don't wait too long to get your tickets. Ballet GRAN FOLKLORICO DE MEXICO will certainly play to a capacity audience like its recent sold out run at Hamilton Place.

It is our hope that other community organizations will join us in using the Capitol Theatre to showcase performances and in restoring it to its proper prominence in our downtown core.

# INTERNATIONAL NOTEBOOK

#### Atlantic City Village

The wheels of chance will be spinning Monday through Saturday along the boardwalk of the Atlantic City Village. All the sounds and tastes of a bona fide casino are to be found with the clink of chips, the shuffle of cards and clicking spin of the wheels... and the appeal of ovsters on the half shell and other seafood favorites. Blackjack and other tournaments will be staged, so be sure to register early. The exciting games of chance make everyone a winner because this fund-raising vehicle for the Ethnoculturefest building fund aids in maintaining the year-round multicultural centre.

#### Best of Britain

Celebrating its tenth anniversary, the Best of Britain Village is hosted by the Ex-Imperial Club at the Erie Avenue U.A.W. Hall. After garnering the Entertainment Award last year, this crew has again assembled a variety of dancers and musicians including local Highland dancers, bagpipers, 'mini-whistlers' (new this year), the comedy mimes 'Clawhammers' and the dance band 'Fare Enuff''. The cosy pub-style hall offers continuous nightly entertainment and a traditional British menu. Proceeds from Village receipts support community sports teams and help in hall improvements.

#### **Budapest**

Visit this grand Hungarian city as presented by the Petofi Hungarian Cultural Club. Nightly performances feature the local Petofi Dancers, with guest groups form Welland, St. Catharines and Hamilton. You can join in after the shows to dance to the music of Hungarian entertainer Sandor Farkas.

#### **Canadian Pioneer**

Founded in 1977, the Canadian Pioneer Social Club is a major 'city-booster'. Their Village features the Canadian Pioneer Square Dancers plus Canadian recording artists, 'Stoker Bros.' and 'Westwind'. On par with the hand-clapping hoe-down is the award-winning historical display of local Canadian Pioneer development. These winners of the 1985 and 1986 Best Overall Village Awards donate more than \$5,000 annually to ventures such as the Games for the Physically Disabled, Participation House and the Capitol Theatre. The festival mascot, Ethno, dons Canadian Pioneer apparel this year to feature this lively Village's uniform of county checkers.

#### Dutch

"All the world's a stage"... and the Dutch Village features a world of entertainment on its stage this year. Direct from Holland, and back by popular demand, is the choir Oosterhoutse Nachtegalen whose forty members perform an extensive repertoire which has been recorded on albums. Direct from Denmark is a youth corps of ninety-two members on International Tour as a concertband and tambourband. The full orchestral sounds of the former are sharply contrasted with the marching drums and flutes of the latter. Rounding out the entertainment scene are the Dutch Cambridge Klopen Dancers, Mel Kitchen & Rockin 'Country and Rockin' Robin for your dancing enjoyment. See the displays of Dutch traditional products, especially flowers and cheese. Combined with the variety of performers, this Village



offers a true sampling of its home country. . . right under its roof.



#### German

Sonnenhof (house of sunshine, literally) was built in 1963 as a club house for the local German community. It has come to host a Village since 1975, sharing its sunshine with a wide-ranging audience. Their own Mardi Gras group, 'Narragonia' performs daily, featuring the championship senior Garde dancers. The Senior Garde has captured the Canadian title for eight years and has toured Europe extensively in competition. Operating since 1953, the German club sponsors a language school for adults (Monday) and children (Saturday); bowling and dart teams, and 'skat' (card game) tournaments on a year-round basis.

#### Hungarian

In 1936 the non-profit Hungarian club was founded for cultural and social purposes. Villages visitors have enjoyed their continuous hospitality and entertainment since 1975. As local performers from 4 to 21 years in age sing and dance in authentic costumes, learn about the culture of seven regions of Hungary. An added feature this year is a daily video show of their own "Csardas" dancers live at Expo '86. Profits from this Village allow the club to offer heritage language and dance classes and to make improvements to their public hall. Annual donations are made to the Police Commission (to send disabled children to camp and train safety patrols), to the International Human Rights Commision and the United Hungarian Fund.

#### Italian

You're invited on a voyage through the Mediterranean to listen to the sounds and savour the sights of Italy. The Pino Cea Band performs nightly, bringing current and traditional musical favorites direct from Italy. Brantford's Italian-Canadian Club presents its hearty 'Allegria' dancers and singers whose enthusiasm will have everyone joining in. Specialties

from the kitchen are sure to make this a special dinner stop.

#### Muslim

A small community of near 70 families, the Muslims debuted with a 2-day open house in 1986. This year, a full 8-day Village is presented with an audio-visual array of the rich contribution of Muslim Scholars to modern sciences and a cultural exhibit relating to Islamic history and architecture from throughout the Muslim world. The books, crafts and rare literature provide an absorbing insight into this world as well the fashions and bridal jewellery displayed. Generous hospitality is extended as the Muslim Association serves free traditional refreshments. Since the 1st Muslim family arrived in Brantford over 20 years ago, the community has become organized, operating a Sunday school under the Heritage Languages Program wherein 40-50 students learn Quaranic Arabic. While they save funds for a future mosque, the Association meets at Brantford Ethnoculturefest to celebrate Muslim Festivals. For their productive role in Ethnoculturefest activities, they were awarded the 1986 President's Award.

#### New York, New York

The 'Big Apple' comes to Brantford, courtesy of the Kinsmen Club of Brantford. The club features the lure of Broadway, Fifth Avenue's allure and Studio 54's nightlife. This year the stage comes alive to Burlington's Sue Irmish Sun Dance Studios whose credits include this springs's ABC mini-series, "I'll Take Manhattan". The New York, New York Village took the Hospitality Award in 1986, only its second year of operation. Club activities since 1942 have centered on activities to raise funds for charitable health and social causes, ranging from donations of apnea monitors to cystic fibrosis research grants to a police safety van.



#### Polish Warszawa

Pierogis and polkas are yours at this joint effort of the Polish community of



Brantford. The well-known Heinal dancers of the Village Polonaise join the Potok dancers as the Warszawa Village unfolds at the Albion St. Polish Alliance Hall. A unique arrangement combining efforts of these groups will see the locale alternate between the two Polish club halls every year, always showcasing both sources of 'home-grown' entertainment. Test your skill in the Polka contest on Friday (finals on Saturday) or enjoy joining in to the strains of the traditional polka bands, 'Echo' and 'Gorale TMF-The Music Factory'. An active participant from the onset of the festival, the Polish Alliance was founded in 1929. It continues to operate a public hall and sponsors the Copernicus Language School, the Potok Dance Group and a library of literary holdings as well as community ventures from sports teams to the Heart Foundation.

#### Trinidad & Tobago

In this eighth year of hosting a Village, Trinidad and Tobago again comes alive with the contagious rhythm and dance direct from these twin islands. The Malik Folk Performers from the Trinidadian festival, "The Prime Minister's Best Village", are back by popular demand, having excited audiences in Brantford at past Villages. Entertainment is complemented by the strains of the local steelband, the Nutones Steel Jammers, the vocalist and band, Jerry Jerome and the Cardells, and Harmony Spinners DJ from St. Catharines. The winners of the 1985 Entertainment Award, Trinidad and Tobago welcomes you with their warm hospitality.

#### Village Ukraina

One of the original participants in the festival, Village Ukraina caters to a family audience with sumptious Ukrainian style home cooking and lively entertainment. All talent is local, including the director, instructors, musicians and especially the dancers. While most performers are of Ukrainian descent, some are not, but have shared equally in the efforts which earned them the Entertainment Award in 1984. Other kudos include the 1985 Cul-

tural Display Award showcasing Kurelek, the noted Ukrainian-Canadian painter. Such was the rare case for 45 members of Csardas, the senior dance group of the Hungarian Social Club of Brantford. They were the only amateur Hungarian group from Ontario performing at Expo's Ontario Pavillion in Vancouver in the summer of 1986.

After Expo extended an official invitation to the Hungarian club's cultural conveners, Pearl Szabo, Rose Szilagyi and Anne Mayer, fund raising events were staged to finance the trip and week-long

#### **Dutch Village Attracts** International Acts

When the choir Oosterhoutse Nachtegalan first visited the International Villages Festival in 1983, they charmed audiences and started friendships with local residents which have endured across the ocean and the years. Returning to the Dutch Village and their Brantford friends, the 40 performers will again give us first class concerts.

Their singing school originated in 1937 from a boys' church choir which is structured to give members a complete general music education. Fifteen years ago, girls were also admitted, as the choir developed without ecclesiastical ties, although still performing at divine services or church ceremonies.

"Nachtegalen" or nightingales - those delicate birds of song - is the final stage of training, following that of "Sparrow, Tit-mouse and Finch", when the "real" choir forms a concert class. With four or five "voices", the choir harmonizes as appropriate for a broad repertoire spinning

classical motets, operas & operettas, to Dutch folk songs and those of the countries visited. As recording artists, the choir is able to finance tours by receipts from record sales and performances.

In accompaniement to the choir, a troup wears the Volendammer costume and performs woodenshoe dances.

An energetic concert tour agenda since 1974 has taken the performers to



the Middle East, the Mediterranean, Germany, Norway, Denmark, U.S.A. and Canada. We welcome them and director Tony Schoones again to Brantford.

Doubling the international music deliahts at the Dutch Village is the 98 member Viborg FDF/FPF Harmonieorkester and Tambour Korps. FDF is a Danish acronym for "voluntary boys league", founded in 1902 as an all-boys Christian organization. It formed a brass band which was later reorganized into a concertband (Harmonieorkester). As late as 1973, upon merger with YWCA scouts in Viborg, a tambourband (drum & flutes) was started together with the FPF (voluntary girls' league). Today, 3 bands and a band-school with over 200 members perform concert tours throughout Europe, Britain and North America and have made a commercial recording.

We are pleased to have them appear at the Dutch Village with their popular repertoire among other, Bizet, Dvorak, Strauss, Bernstein and current motion

Congratulations to Helen Rivers and Pat Eyzenga for capturing these impressive international acts!

#### Trinidad North

For a number of years, Trinidad's "Prime Minister's Best Village" festival has sustained a relationship with Brantford's International Villages which has given local residents a taste of their real live carnival. The air of authenticity is heavy with the rhythmic beat of drummers and throbbing pulse of exotic dancers from the Caribbean. The Malik Folk Performers, among the top five acts at the Trinidadian Festival, are no strangers to Brantford, having thrilled our audiences at past villages.

We welcome them again to our International Villages and encourage festivalgoers to make them and all visiting performers as at-home as possible. It shouldn't be hard when all the world opens its doors during Villages week.



# A LITTLE ABOUT **ETHNOCULTUREFEST**

#### WHO ARE WE?

Brantford Ethnoculturefest is a multiservice, multicultural, non-profit charitable organization with three basic roles in the community.

We are a unique social service agency which addresses the culturally specific needs of our new Canadian and ethnocultural clients in their adaptation to Canadian lifestyle.

We are a community educator through our promotion of positive intercultural and cross-cultural communications and understanding amongst our ethnocultural groups and the mainstream population.

Finally, we are the coordinating agency for folkloric celebrations, such as the annual International Villages Festival, which promote and foster a sharing of our cultural heritage.

#### **HOW ARE WE FUNDED?**

Funding sources for the ongoing programs and activities include: the Ministry of Health, the Ministry of Citizenship and Culture, Secretary of State - Multiculturalism, the Department of Immigration, and our own fund-raising activities.

#### **HOW ARE WE DIFFERENT?**

Counselling Services deal specifically with the re-adjustment needs of our ethnic community, and the problems that might evolve from the re-adjustment process. Immigration is a continuous process of transition in an environment where the traditional social support systems are no longer available. Often the resulting stresses are rooted in the difference between cultures and the barriers to adaptation.

Our social work staff recognize the inherent conflicts between cultural values and traditions and their impact on an individuals circumstances. They work closely with trained aides who provide interpretive services when language is a barrier, thus, any restrictions to effective counselling are non-existent.

The counsellors are primarily involved with transition and adaptation programs which include Newcomer Settlement Counselling dealing with immediate needs of housing, health, language and employment, as well as intergenerational counselling dealing with family conflicts.

Information programs, referral services, as well as advocacy assistance are also part of the caseload.

#### OUR QUALIFIED COUNSELLING STAFF OFFER THESE PROGRAMS:

CITIZENSHIP CLASSES held for five weekly sessions, in preparation for obtaining your Canadian Citizenship.

JOB SEARCH TECHNIQUES, held for eight weekly sessions, designed to assist ethnic people in their pursuit of employ-

ENGLISH LANGUAGE ASSISTANCE is provided in individualized and group settings as an alternative to traditional community classes. Our summer children's program "KID'S STUFF" develops a youngster's language learning in a primary school, play-oriented environ-

ETHNIC WOMEN'S COFFEE HOUR extends an arm of mutual support, sharing and learning.


The program, designed to discourage drinking and driving during the Festival, met with success in 1986, with many people taking advantage of the service.

## A 'TASTE' OF THINGS TO COME

#### INTERNATIONAL SMORGASBORD

The eight days of "the Villages" provide an escape to the sights, sounds and smells of a world of difference. How better to experience the essence of a culture than by tantalizing your tastebuds with the edible delights prepared daily with homemade care by Village volunteers.

And when it's all over, we offer you the chance to discover in your own kitchen the nuances of regional dishes whose spices and ingredient combinations have built traditions. You could cater an eight-course meal with the variety of offering the Villages represent. Start the appetizers with oysters on the half shell (with just a squirt of fresh lemon juice) from Atlantic City Village...sample the hearty Polish soup, choldnik, to prime your appetite for diverse main courses of Ukrainian pyrohy, German sauer braten, Muslim pulao, Trinidadian candied sweet potatoes and New York's spicy wings. Top off the table with a worldly dessert tray of inimitable Canadian Pioneer apple pie, rich Italian cannoli and the Hungarian treats, szilvás gomboc. Nibble on a tray of famous Dutch cheeses as the meal is rounded out by either a Youthful mug of irreplaceable milk or a frosty pitcher of British stout...whatever your tastes, the Villages cater to your fancy.

Now recreate the scene...the brightly costumed dancers, the lively strains of music and, oh yes, the delicious aroma. Go to it and enjoy the food which makes the Festival fantastic!

#### **GERMAN: SAUER BRATEN**

- lbs. beef (blade or chuck) allspices
- salt and pepper 6 onion slices
- pint vinegartbsp. sugar

- 4 bay leaves flour
- 8 peppercorns

Wipe meat with damp cloth and sprinkle thoroughly with salt and pepper. Place in an earthen dish and add vinegar and enough water to cover. Add bay leaves , peppercorn, allspice and onions. Let stand tightly covered in a cool place for at least 24 hours. Drain meat, place in a dutch oven and brown well on all sides. Add onions and 1 cup of spiced vinegar mixture. Cover tightly and cook over low heat about 3 hours or until meat is tender. When meat is cooked, add sugar and flour and cook for 10 minutes more. This makes delicious gravy. Serves 8.

## HUNGARIAN: SZILVAS GOMBOC (plum dumplings)

- 1/2 peck ripe plums 1 tsp. salt
- 5 medium potatoes buttered bread crumbs
- 1 egg beaten sugar
- 4 cups flour (unsifted) cinnamon

Cook potatoes and mash. Add warm to sifted flour and salt on noodle board. Work between palms of hands until potatoes and flour are blended. Make a well. Add egg and knead gently until blended.

Clean board. Roll dough out to 1/2 inch thick on floured board. Cut into 4 inch saugres, place plum in center and fold corners to middle, then roll in palm of hand till round. Cook a few dumplings at a time in salted boiling water for about 10 minutes. Take out with slotted spoon and place in a roaster with 4 tablespoons melted butter. Sprinkle with buttered bread crumbs which have been mixed with 1/2 cup sugar and 2 tablespoons cinnamon. When you add another layer, dot dumplings with melted butter before placing on the buttered crumbs. Keep warm in low oven. Serve.

#### Plum Filling

Wash and pit plums making sure plums stay whole. In each hole place 1/2 teaspoon of sugar and cinnamon mixture.

#### ITALIAN: CANNOLI ALLA SICILIANA (sicilian cannoli)

#### Dough:

- 2 3/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour 2 tbsp. sugar
- 1/4 cup butter
- l egg
- 2/3 cup white wine or marsala egg white (to brush dough) deep

#### fat or oil, heated to 380 degrees Cream fillina:

- 1 lb. ricotta cheese
- cups sifted icing sugarcup minced mixed candied fruits
- & cherries
- 2 oz. (2 squares) bitter chocolate coarsely ground additional candied cherries

#### Dough

In a bowl, mix flour and sugar. Cut in butter until particles are very fine. Add egg and wine (or marsala) gradually to obtain a thick dough. Knead on a floured surface until smooth- about 5 minutes. Cover and let stand for at least an hour.

#### Cream

Press ricotta through a sieve and mix confectioners sugar (reserving 2 tbsp. for later use), candied fruit and chocolate. Chill. Roll dough into a paper-thin sheet on a floured surface. Cut into 5 inch rounds and wrap each round around a metal cylinder called connoli tube, brushed with olive oil. Seal ends by brushing with a little egg white. Deep-fry the cannoli a few at a time in pre-heated oil until lightly browned. Drain on paper towels and cool for a while. Slide metal cylinders out carefully. When ready to serve, stuff cannoli with cream filling using a pastry bag with a wide round spout. Put half of a cherry at each end and dust with confectioner's cont'd....page 26





#### MORE FOOD.....

#### POLISH: CHOLDNIK

(sour-milk soup with beet greens)

- oz. beet greens (young leaves & stalks or red beets)
- cup water lemon juice or vinegar
- cucumber or dill pickle
- eggs, hard boiled
- cups sour milk or butter milk
- cup sour cream
- tbsp. chopped dill and chives salt

Rinse beet greens, cut and cook in water adding small quantity of lemon juice or vinegar. Cool. Peel cucumber or dill pickle and slice into thin rounds. Shell and chop hard boiled eggs. Stir sour milk thoroughly and mix with beet greens and stock. Add cucumber or pickle, eggs and sour cream. Add salt. Add chopped green dill and chives. Serve with bread or

#### TRINIDAD: CANDIED SWEET POTATOES

- boiled sweet potatoes
- cup water
- tbsp. butter or margarine
- cup brown sugar
- tsp. salt
- tsp. aromatic bitters

Cut sweet potatoes in half length-wise and arrange in a greased baking dish. Combine brown sugar, water, salt and butter or margarine and cook for three minutes over low heat. Stir in Angostura aromatic bitters and pour over potatoes. Bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees) for about 30 minutes.

#### **UKRAINIAN: PYROHY**

- cups flour
- cup warm water
- tbsp. cooking oil
- eggs
- tsp. salt

Beat the eggs and add to the warm water and oil.Blend well, then add flour and salt. Knead dough until smooth and soft. Cover dough and let rest for 30 minutes, roll out thin. Cut into squares or rounds. Place a teaspoon of filling on each piece, pinch edges well together to seal. Drop into boiling salted water and boil for about eight minutes. Strain in a colander and pour 1 cup cold water over them. Drain, place in dish, sprinkle with oil, toss gently to coat evenly. Fry chopped onions in oil. Spread over pyrohy and serve hot.

#### Filling:

#### Potato filling

- cups mashed potatoes
- 1/2 cup cottage cheese salt and pepper to taste
- 1/2 tbsp. onion chopped

Saute onion in oil, season and add to potato and cheese. Mix well

#### Plum filling

- 1/2 cup water
- 1/4 tsp. cinnamon
- cup prunes sugar to taste

Bring prunes to boil. Cool, remove stones and chop fine.

#### Sauerkraut filling

Cook 2 cups sauerkraut. Drain and press out water. Chop 1 small onion and fry in 4 tbsp. cooking oil. Add to sauer-

#### Poppy seed filling

To 1/2 cup prepared poppy seed, scalded and ground fine add a pinch of salt and pepper, and 2 tbsp. sugar. Mix

#### Raisin filling

1/4 cup sugar and 1/2 tsp. of cornstarch into each dumpling; seal well.

#### MUSLIM: PULAO

(chicken and rice)

- cloves, as desired

whole black pepper whole cinnamon


Soak rice in water for half an hour. Bring skinned chicken to boil in 4 cups of water. Remove chicken and save remaining broth. Fry sliced onion in vegetable oil in another pan. Add chicken and spices, and fry contents while adding small quantities of yogurt. Add broth when chicken is slightly brown, and bring it to a boil. Add strained rice and cook until water evaporates. Cook in oven at 250 degrees for about 15 minutes.







# What makes Executive Class so good? The power of suggestions.
