REPORT...

That they have had the said petitions under consideration, and report the following statement of facts. That it appears from the documents accompanying the petitions, that the petitioners, were, both men of extensive property, in and contiguous to the village of New-Ark, in Upper Canada, that after the taking possession of that place, by the United States army, under the command of general Dearborn, that the petitioners were active and zealous, in their endeavours to promote the success of our arms; and were solicitous to add, all in their power, to the comfort and convenience of our troops; that they gave up their houses, for quarters for officers and soldiers; and on all occasions, manifested so strong an attachment to the American cause, that their disloyalty to the British government, was so apparent and notorious, that they deemed it unsafe for them to
