"I take my pen to inform you that I am well, alter a loig and per less porting them the Indian country. Cape Wils, myself, and an hundred friendly Indians, left bur Wayne on the lest of August to es ort in capt. Heald, fram fort Chicaugo, as he was in danges of being capture, by the Bridshi Orders had been giv in to abendon that fort and retreat to fort Wayne, a distance of 150 miles. We reached fort Chicaugo on the 10th of Aurent, and on the 15th we prepared for an immadiate march, burning all that we could not fetch with us. On the 15th, at 8 o'clock, we commenced our murch, with our small force, which consisted of captain Webs, myself, and our 100 Confitte Indians, captain Heade's 100 men. 10 women, and 10 children—in all 232. We had marched had a mile, when we we were attreked by 600 kickapoo and Winebage Indians. In the moment of trial, our Confute savages joined the savage enemy. Our confust hate at milmies, when every man, woman, and child was killed except 15. Thanks be to God I was one of those who escaped.—First they shot the feather off my cap, next the epaulette from my shoulder, and then the handle from my sword. I then surrendered to four savage, rascals. The Confute chief, taking me by the land, and speaking English, said, Jordan, I know you, you gave me tobacco at fort Wayne. We won kill you, but come and see what we will do with your raptain; so leading me to where Wells lay, they cut off bis head, and put it on a long pole, while another took not his heart, and divided among the chiefs, and they cai in praw. Then they scalped the slain, and stripped the prisoners, and gathered in a ting, with us fifteen poor wretches in the middle. They had nearly fell out about the divide, but my old chief the White Riccoon holding me last, they mide the divide and departed to their towns.
