First Time in History, OSD **Pupil Awarded Safety Flag**

For the first time in the his-tory of any school for the deat in Canada an "Elmer" safety pennant was presented to the students of the Ontario School for the Deaf yesterday after-noon. The presentation is the climax of a month's hard work on the part of Sgt. R. W. Latchford of the Belleville City Police and the staff of the OSD, in developing and presenting a course in safety to the students of OSD. The project required some

of OSD. The project required some study and observation prior to its introduction to the students due to the different nature of presenting material which was necessary. Sgt. Latchford had to spend some time observing in-struction procedure in classes before his safety program was promulgated.

promulgated. To assist in the work a special portable, table-top model il-lustrating the different types of lights and intersections was built by the OSD students in their own workshops under staff guidance. The instructional aid

guidance. The instructional aid allows for practical demonstra-tions of the proper way of walking or driving at intersec-tions and so forth and is com-plete with flashing lights and operating traffic lights. Most of the school's 500 pu-pils have received the safety instruction course and the pre-sentation of the "Elmer" pen-nant by the safety committee of the local Kiwanis Club is to re-mind the students daily to obey and observe safety rules.

The students and staff of the intermediate and senior schools were drawn up before the flag-pole in front of the main build-ing en masse. half of the students, that they would always try to obey the six safety rules. If any pupil is found breaking one of the rules or if a student is involved in an acci-dent, the "Elmer" pennant cannot be flown for 30 days.

Mr. Leo McKee, chairman of the safety committee of the Kiwanis, spoke briefly, em-phasizing that the pennant was to remind the boys and girls to

obey the safety rules. Following the ceremony outside a short program was held in the junior school, when another pen-nant was presented to them. This pennant is to be flown in the junpole.
