Washington, Feb. 13 (AP)-The United States navy has spent about \$40,000,000 since the war on lighter than air craft and equipment.

All the ships except the Los Angeles have crashed.

Following is the amount spent by the navy on dirigibles between 1918 and 1933:

ZR 2, bought in England, crashed during test flight there August, 1921; loss to United States, \$1,000,-

EMENANDOAH, grashed, 1925, \$2,-200,000.

LOS ANGELES, decommissioned, 1932 (no original cost to U. S. be-cause ship was received from Germany on reparations account).

AKRON, crashed April, 1933, \$5,-

MACON, crashed February 12 1935, \$2,600,000,

In addition, the navy has spent \$9,000,000 on the station at Lakehurst and \$4,500,000 on the Sunnyvale, Cal., station.

Up to 1933 it had spent \$9,000,000 on maintenance and replacements, \$3,000,000 on helium, \$800,000 on experimental development.

DEATH OF DAUGHTER

Evidence at -Trial Indicated Death Result of Ill-Treatment

Circumstantial Evidence is Explained in Brief Address of Judge

SPECTATORS—WARNED

Judge Refers to Alibi Witnesses and State's Contention

Flemington, N.J., Feb. 13. - The jury trying Bruno Richard Hauptmann for the kidnapping and-murder of Baby Charles A. Lindbergh, Jr., began its deliberations before noon today after being instructed it could return three possible verdicts-murder in the first degree, the same with recommendation for life imprisonment, or acquittal.

Defence exceptions to the court's charge were heard after the jury retired at 11:23 n.m.

Defence Objections.

The defence objected specifically to what it said was the court's inference the Lindbergh nursery had been entered by means of a ladder. that the baby had been carried down a ladder, that the baby's sleeping suit had been ripped off where a thumb guard was found in Hunter-don county, and that first degree murder would lie if a burglary was

Objection also was taken to the court's remarks about the manner of the baby's death, to the court's failure to mention any defence wit-nesses, aside from the defendant, and to a comparison made between the defence and state alibi witnesses,

Arguments For Exceptions.

Arguments for the exceptions took 50 minutes of the court's time after the jury retired. The defence objected to the failure of the court to deliver 12 other instructions it had suggested. 'Adjournment was taken at 12:09 p.m. Flemington, N.J., Feb. 13. -- The

Flemington, N.J., Feb. 13.-The Hauptmann Jury, had lunch, sandwiches and coffee-brought to it at 1.40 p.m. today. This was generally interpreted as meaning no agreement was immediately in prospect.

Plemington, N.J., Feb. 13- (AP) - At 1 p.m. today the Jury trying the murder case against Bruno Richard Haupfmann had been deliberating for one hour and 37 minutes, with no word coming from the jury room:

When the verdict comes, the court ruled, only the interested parties, including Mrs. Hauptmann, the Attorneys and the Press are to be allowed in the couffroom. Mrs. Hauptmann sat at the Defence Counsel table with two friends. A short time later Mrs. Haupf-

mann made her way through the crowds to the yellow frame house where she has been staying. She will wait there for the tolling of the Courthouse bell, which will mean a verdict. Hauptmann was taken 10 his cell to await his fate.
