


Follow the Bulls live on the air

Again this season CJBQ 800 will broadcast all 33 of the Belleville Bulls road games.

As well, Cablevue 4 will televise one game per week on a tape delayed basis.

Sports director Jack Miller will handle the play-by-play du-ties on both radio and television broadcasts. He'll be joined in the booth by The Intelligencer's Tom Gavey and Paul Svoboda. Todd Smith of CJBQ is also expected to handle some play-by-play duty, especially on television.

All radio broadcasts will begin 15 minutes prior to game time.

This year three early Bulls games conflict with the Toronto Blue Jays and Miller says the Jays will be broadcast on CJTN

Radio while the Bulls take over CJBQ those nights.

The "rule of thumb" for TV games (21 will be shown) is that Wednesday games are shown on Thursday nights on Channel 4 and if there is no mid-week game the Saturday contest is taped and shown Sunday night. Producer Bill Freestone says

this year the broadcasts will feature slow motion replays, a first in the 15 years Cablevue has been showing the games.

Belleville will also host Global TV's first broadcast of the season on Jan. 13 when the Guelph Platers visit the Quinte Sports Centre.

Miller will again be the playby-play voice for Global.
