The 1991 Young & Modern Man, Johnny Whitworth of Texas, has since signed a production deal with ABC Television and is now on his way to making a name for himself in Hollywood.

Casselman, who lives with his family in Foxboro, was one of only three Canadians to make it to the final in the contest.

And both he and close friend Melissa Lambert — who nominated him — are hoping for a victory;

not just because of the cash and exposure, but for reasons of Canadian pride.

Nothing would be better, Lambert says, than to see a Canadian get the nod in a U.S.-based magazine's contest against predominantly American contestants.
