As cook, she fed her guests large meals with lots of fruit, vegetables which she had canned, potatoes and meat.

Due to the excellent fishing at the camp, "there was always a big platter of fish."

Keller says she "still eats pretty good." When she doesn't feel like cooking, she orders a meal from Barbara's Country Kitchen, which delivers it.

When she was younger she played piano often, but arthritis forced her to quit.

A cane now hangs on the back of a chair in her apartment, but she never needed it until she fell in September, 1994.

"I was 100 per cent before I fell. It took the stuffing out of me," she says with a laugh.

Keller has two sons living in the area and they assist her when she wants to go shopping or get out for other reasons, such as church.

Along with attending at Foxboro, she also attends St. Matthew's (formerly Holloway United). When asked about her health,


she says she feels "pretty good" and

her hearing and eyesight are fine, although she adds, "of course, I have glasses." She hopes a cataract prob-lem will be fixed soon. She has an appointment with an eye doctor in July.
