The acting director of Big Brothers Big Sisters of Hastings and Prince Edward Counties well knows the importance of taking kids on such simple outings as fishing trips, movies, apple orchards and even Belleville Bulls hockey games.

Trevor whom she said is "very supportive of my role in the agency and has helped out on many occasions."
