"They have been 32 wonderful years in Catholic education and I still feel fortunate that when I need a fix, I can supply teach or do an administrative replacement," she said.

"I have been blessed more by my career than I think I blessed others, at least I hope I blessed others."

Hawkes plans to keep busy in retirement.

She will be spending more time with her husband and daughters, one of whom is getting married in less than year's time.

she said proudly.

"I already have four written and produced one while at St. Mary's. I have also written articles for professional periodicals and I hope to continue that as well."
