

JACK GRAYDON RETIRES Registrar for 46 years

A man who knows more about the land in Prince Edward County than anyone else, Jack Vanderlip Graydon, has retired as land registrar after serving 46 years in Picton.

Typical of many residents of the county, Mr. Graydon is of United Empire Loyalist stock. He registered approximately 90,000 documents during a career which began on March 31, 1935 when as a deputy he received \$90 a month, a salary which rose to \$100 a month when he was appointed registrar on March 11, 1936.

Because Mr. Graydon had to register, abstract, and prepare any requested abstract of titles, he had a personal and unfaltering awareness of the geographical layout of many parcels of land throughout the county and also a great awareness of the quality of many titles.

Before presenting Mr. Graydon with a watch, the Dean of Eastern Ontario Land Registrars, Wendell Stanley, said that 46 years in the Prince Edward County registry office is an enviable record that few people, if any, will ever duplicate.
