GONE TO HIS REST.

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Prof. Greene Succombs to His Injuries and Quietly Passes Away.

Pcof. S. T. Greene, of the Institution for the Deaf, is dead. This announcement. we are sure, will bring sorrow to many hearts. Since the accident, two weeks ago by which he was so seriously injured, there Lave been many anxious inquiries after his condition. His strong constitution and pronounced vital powers encouraged the hope that the paralysis and unconsciousness would be overcome, and a restoration to his usual health and usefulness be assured. Though in a critical condition his friends and the attending physicians cid not despair of ultimate recovery. On Sunday the 16th there was a change for the worse and as evening approached it was seen that his strength was rapidly fail' ing. At an early hour this morning he peacefully passed away, and to-day there is a general expression of sorrow for the loss of one so greatly esteemed. By his genialty, his kindness and his willingness to assist as far as possible in promoting social and other interests he endeared himself to many at the Institution. he best known, where 16 and where his work has left a lasting impresaion on the minds and hearts of the deaf pupils who have passed through the classes during the past twenty years; there were many tearful eyes when the news of his death reached them. The loss is felt to be almost irretrievable, as Prof. Greene was so closely identified with everything connected with the institution, and possess such rare qualifications to interest and instruct the mute children. It will be a d fi cult task to find one to sopply his place. Born in the city of Portland, Main he received his rudimentary education at the Hartford school for the deaf. and graduatt ed with the degree of B. A. from the National College at Washington, D. C. Soon after graduating he came here, and engaged as teacher under the late Dr. Palmer, where he has remained since, doing excellent work, winning the confidence and respect of all his associates. He leaves a wife and four children, who mourn the loss of a kind, intelligent, and devoted husband and father. We can assure them that they have the sincere sympathy of the whole community in their greatsorrow and bereavement.
