Loyalist graduate honored

Georgina Thompson, president of All-Care Health Services and Thurlow Township councillor, has received a Premier's Award for outstanding achievement as a college graduate. Thompson graduated from the nursing program at Loyalist in 1978. Rotary Club, and has served as a councillor for Thurlow Township since 1988. She is an executive member of the Ontario Palliative Care Association, and also chairs the Centre and South Hastings Recycling Board. Thompson has many other community and professional commitments.
