Lloyd Thompson died in 1988, but his legacy as one of Canada's most respected portrait photographers lives on in skillfully created and proudly displayed portraits in the homes of prominent people across

From a combat photographer, including photographing the D-Day landings in Europe, to student of Malak Karsh, brother of internationally acclaimed Yosuf Karsh, to studio entrepreneur in The Royal York Hotel, Toronto, and later Picton, to police photographer for many years, Thompson's work was marked by good humor, inspired poses and outstanding darkroom techniques.
