Y Hero Medal Awarded Belleville Boy, Age 11

At 11 years old Robert Thompson is a public school student, a strong swimmer and a clarinet player.

And yesterday he offically became a hero.

That and more.

With the award of the YMCA heroic services gold medal he becomes a member of the most exclusive club of courageous Canadians.

Only four such medals have award was initiated in Canada in the 1930s.

Robert, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. W. Thompson, 220 John Street, received the citation calmly — just as calmly as the way he earned it.

It was his livel thinking in a dangerous situation the afternoon of Aug. 20 in the Moira River at Latta that won him the award.

That day he went to the rescue of his parents' friend, Mrs. Heidi Stroempl of Tweed, as she was stricken with

cramp while swimming.

Robert was too lightweight to practice on an adult the lifesaving techniques he had learned during swimming invariation at the Belleville Y.

Instead he pushed the drowning woman underwater and as she broke surface clapped an air tube over her head. Then he easily towed her ashore.

His nimble thinking in the emergency was credited by police with saving Mrs. Stroempi's life.

The medal was granted as soon as the national YMCA executive was informed by local officials, says Belleville Y president Harry Fast.

Mr. Fast went to Robert's house yesterday with Alderman Donald Williams, national Y vice-president, to confirm the citation.

The only thing missing was the gold medal.

Since the award is a rarity no replicas are kept in stock. Each one must be individually struck for presentation.

Robert's award, says Mr. Fast, now is in the making and will likely be publicly presented some time next month.

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
