It's sometimes difficult to imagine a 100 year dif-ference. But it was crystal clear for people at Rebecca Juby's birthday party Wednesday. As she cradled Michael Clarke, her eight-month-old great great grandson, it represented the two extremes of five living generations of a family – a relatively rare oc-currence

A 100th birthday is a special thing and Hugh O'Neil, MPP Quinte, was on hand to present Mrs. Juby with a cer-tificate from Premier Bill Davis honoring the occasion. Currently living in Hastings Manor, Mrs. Juby is a life-long. resident of the area. Born to Mr. and Mrs. Irvine Ray, in Melrose, on March 3, 1882, she was the second woungest of 10 children.

the Loyalist-Wallbridge Road. Mrs. Juby left the area to study nursing in Lowell, Mass. and worked briefly at the Belleville General Hospital before going into private nurs-

In 1907 she married John Juby and the couple had two sons, Robert and Garnet, both of whom were on hand

Wednesday. In the next few years the Juby family lived in the Fox-boro area on Consessions 5 and 6 of Sidney Township and then on Concession 3 of Thurlow. Mrs. Juby attended the Presbyterian Church in Foxboro. The couple retired in 1944 and moved back to Foxboro. Mr. Juby died in 1969 and Mrs. Juby moved to Cedar Street in Belleville where she resided until moving into Hastings Manor in 1978
