Dr. Jack Marshall part of long family dental history

Long-time dentist and orthodontist, Dr. Jack Marshall, whose family served the Belleville area for more than 100 years, died earlier this week.

He was 92.

Dr. John (Jack) Marshall was born in Belleville and became the third generation of dentists in his family.

After graduating from the University of Toronto in 1929, Dr. Marshall began practising dentistry in Belleville, working only on children.

"He was very fond of children," said his wife of 60 years, Grace Marshall, in an interview Thursday.

Marshall was a member of the Rotary Club of Belleville for 54 years and was recently made an honorary life member. He also served on city council for years, was a member of the board of governors for Belleville General Hospital, sat on the board of health for many years and was instrumental in starting a local branch of the Ontario Dental Association, says Grace.

Although he had been in failing health for the last four years, Marshall had formerly been an active War and the second seco

In the later years of his career Marshall began working as an orthodontist and eventually switched completely to orthodontics. He semiretired in 1969 but continued working part-time until the mid-1970s.

Marshall was proud to have worked in his profession long enough that the combined years of service given by his grandfather, father and himself totalled more than 100.
