## Headmaster ready for next level

He graduated from Lakefield College School in 1973. For the past eight years, he's served as that school's director of admissions and also taught economics.

Lakefield now boasts a student population of 298 in its Grades 9-13 program; however, the private school is planning on adding a Grade 7 and 8 program in the fall

of 1998.
