Former vice - president and general manager of the Corbin Lock Company, Lloyal Ellsworth McLean, 7 Alexander Street, died Sunday in Belleville General Hospital.

Mr. McLean had been ill for the past three weeks after falling and breaking his hip. He was in his 84th year.

Born at Orillia, he was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert McLean and came to Belleville from Decatur, Illinois, in 1920.

He went to work for the former Springer Lock Company in 1922 and in 1934 — three years after the firm was taken over by Corbin Lock Company — became vice-president and general manager, a position he retained until his retirement in 1959.

Predeceased by his wife, the former Jennie Cook, in 1963, Mr. McLean is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Gordon (Marjorie) Edwards, and Mrs. James (Dorothy) Ward, both of Belleville, and Mrs. Gerald (Peggy) Hyde of St. Thomas.

Also surviving are five grandchildren and two brothers Harold and Howard Mc-Lean, both of Baldwin Park, California.
