Dr. Morton then entered his father's newspaper business, The Ontario Intelligencer Publishing Co. where he became managing editor, a position he held until the death of his father in 1962. He then took over the business, becoming president and publisher

Dr. Morton retired in 1977, when his son Myles took over

Dr. Morton was a member of Bridge Street United Church.
