
Tetrathlon takes Rosie overseas

Athletic versatility and a love of horses will help send 17-year-old Rosie Mullins to British Columbia in early August and to the British Isles for the remainder of the sum-

Mullins, who lives on the second of Huntington north of Belleville, will be taking part in an obscure competition known as Tetrathlon, a contest involving four disciplines; riding, running, swimming and shooting.

The grade 13 student at Centre Hastings Secondary School recently earned a high points award at the Central Ontario Tetrathlon competition in Newmarket, placing first in three events and fifth in shooting.

"I've been into riding and running since I was eight," Rosie said this week, shortly after another training ride at her parents farm. "I was 12 when I got into Tetration. I liked it and kept go-


Mullins, daughter of David and Gillian Mullins, competes in senior girls competition (ages 15-21) and will attend the National Tetrathlon championships in B.C. July 30-Aug. 4. Within two days of completion of the nationals, Rosie will join the Canadian National team for a three-competition tour of the British Isles, which includes two stops in England and one competition in Ireland. She won't return to Canada until Aug. 27.

Tetrathlon involves a two kilometre cross country run, four minutes of swimming, a two kilometre cross country ride and air pistol competition at a turning target from 10 metres.

Tetrathlon is a forerunner to Pentathlon, an event which adds fencing to the riding, running, swimming and shooting.

Shooting is her weakest event. "I just got started last year," she said. "It's all menal and concentration. My concentration is shot. My

Rosie works at Campbell's Orchards to help raise funds for both August trips.

The 10-member Canadian National team will have to foot the bill for their own travel expenses to Great Britain although competitors will be billetted when they are in England and Ireland.
