## Long Service Recognized

A man who for the past 17 years has acted as "policeman" for the Unemployment Insurance Commission this week marked completion of 25 years' service in the different branches of the federal employment agency.

He is Eric Naylor, inspector with the enforcement branch of the U.I.C. at Belleville, who joined the former National Selective Service back in 1942, shortly after the federal agency took over the role of the Ontario employment service.

Mr. Naylor was presented with his quarter century pin yesterday by Cecil Hiuser, manager of the Unemployment Insurance Commission office at Belleville.

An inspector with the enforcement branch it is Mr. Naylor's role to guard against "unemployed" workers trying to get an unfair advantage in insurance payments.

In this role Mr. Naylor has made literally "hundreds" of court appearances in the East Central Ontario area. His area ranges from Brighton to Deseronto and from Lake Ontario to Algonquin Park.

One of Mr. Naylor's first

jobs with the former National Selective Service was directing wartime workers into more essential jobs.

Then as now, the role of employment officer had its problems, but the problem was to find workers for the job, not jobs for the workers.

Later Mr. Naylor worked temporarily as veterans' officer and in 1945 became employment branch supervisor and in 1950 was transferred to the legal branch of the insurance department. He has been 17 years in his present job as inspector.

As enforcement branch inspector Mr. Naylor is required to have certain legal knowledge. Two years ago he received a Doctor of Laws degree from the Free Protestant University at Stonebridge, England.
